Most Tourist Boats are Here Today—Seattle Halibut Landings For Week—Dr. Thompson Returns to Coast.

Marking the conclusion of the season of Alaska tourist sailings, two coastal liners were in port this morning in the course of their final Skagway voyages of the year. At 9:30 a.m. the Princess Charlotte, Capt. William Palmer, arrived from the south, and the Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, from the north. The Princess Charlotte left at 11 a.m. for Skagway whence she is due back here southbound Saturday afternoon. The Prince Rupert sails at 3 p.m. for Vancouver and will be back here Friday. After

there were no sales of halibut on the Prince Rupert Fish Exchange Saturday.

With good-sized list of passengers, Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 8 last evening from the south and "balled" a couple of hours later for Stewart. Any other and other northern points whence she will return here tomorrow southbound. The vessel will be taking south members of the Wales Island and Arrandale canyery crews from the Nasas River this week.

Halibut landings at Seattle for last week totalled 592,500 pounds. The Whiz Fish Co. led the buyers at the Puget Sound port in quantity of fish bought, taking 119,500 pounds. Sebastian-Stuart was a close second with 117,000 pounds. Prices were steady, the average being fractionally over 10c. On Saturday three vessels from Area No. 3 sold catches totalling 33,000 pounds as follows: Tordenskjold, 23,000 pounds; Sebastian-Stuart, 19,000 and 9c; Maddock, 9,000, Washington, 15,000 and 10c; Freya, 25,000 Whiz, 19,000 and 9c.

Dr. Will F. Thompson, director of investigations of the International Fisheries Commission, who is well known in Prince Rupert, returned to his headquarters in Seattle at the end of the week after an extended trip to Europe. He attended meetings of the International Council for the Exploitation of the Sea in Denmark and also visited England, Scotland and Norway and other countries to study the fisheries. Among other things he investigated experiments being made in European countries with fishing for halibut with gillnetts. On the way back to the Pacific Coast Dr. Thompson stopped off at Ottawa to confer with Canadian fisheries authorities.
