### Bernice Palmer says . . .

I was most interested in a recent editorial "Geography of Kaien Island and District" and heartily agree with the editor. Once before I spoke of advertising Prince Rupert but it is impossible to advertise anything until you are sold on it yourself and until you are thoroughly familiar with your subject.

In California almost every community has its local annual celebration. Hayward has its rodeo and men, women and children turn out as galloping cow hands and bronco busters. Santa Rosa is known throughout the length and breadth of California for its colorful Fiesta of the Roses. The town is decked out as a veritable bower of roses and Spanish señoritas and gay caballeros flirt behind dainty fans and re-live days long past.

Hang Town revives early gold rush days and, for weeks before, men carefully nurture their beards for the day. Another little town has its frog jumping competition and still another its fish derby. The fish derby has just ended and the crowd this year was larger than ever and prizes more elaborate. All these fiestas had a small beginning but are today an integral part of American communities. People come from all over the state to attend these celebrations. They have learned of them through newspapers and from others who have been or are going. They are community affairs and the whole town takes part.

Appropriate costumes are worn by young and old and those not in fancy dress are often subjected to a fine. Points of interest, historical or otherwise, are visited and souvenirs and postcards are on display for visitors to carry away—a decidedly painless method of advertising.

Now why couldn't Prince Rupert do something of this kind? Kaien Island is a beautiful name and could sound the keynote for the whole celebration. Have an annual Indian potlache! Let one and all dress in gay Indian costumes, war paint, feathers and all! Of course, I know Indians just don't go around that way any more but neither do we see Spanish grandees on the streets today—except for these special occasions. Let the children put on some Indian plays, learn the story of Hiawatha—and perhaps even invent a pretty totem pole dance! How many of you saw Rose Marie and the lovely totem pole dance in that? My goodness Prince Rupert has a fiesta all made to order. You are surrounded with towns with pretty Indian names and there are some very fascinating Indian folk stories. When I was a little girl Max Collison and C. C. Perry, who was then Indian Agent used to hold me spellbound with their tales. People are always interested in anything that has a "story" attached. Remember Morte Craig and his curio shop? That was one of the first places tourists used to head for when their boats landed in Prince Rupert but they were much more interested in his stories than his wares and bought just to hear what he had to relate in regard to a certain article. I will never forget the time one tourist called his bluff. After listening to a particularly absorbing story about a silver spoon with totem pole handle that had been hammered out by no less than the Indian Chief himself, this particular tourist turned it over and remarked: "This must have been made by a very well educated Indian," pointing to the trade mark on the back. But Morte wasn't stumped. Quickly he answered, "Yes, for a fact, he was. So many young bucks were copying his particular spoon he had to get the government to step in and patent it. That's what is on the back." The delighted tourist bought the spoon and is probably still telling that story.

Hold special moonlight excursions, canoe trips, swimming parties and, above all, fishing parties! Fishermen are notorious enthusiasts and will go miles and spend plenty to get a good day's fishing. Offer prizes for the largest fish brought in as they do at Martinez here! During the fishing derby Carquinez Straits is literally alive with people, old and young, all out for the great derby. Those living in Martinez and along the banks of the straits throw their homes open for the great day and everyone is host. This year the crowd was greater than ever before and even Canada sent its quota of fishermen. Decorate the town with bunting!
