

## Late Telegraphs Britain Sends Protest To General Franco Following Incident

Right to Collect Damages is Reserved Although Affair Is Termed "Accident"-Eight Were Killed

LONDON, June 9: (CP)—The British government blames Spanish insurgents for the mine which the British destroyer Hunter hit off Almeria on May 13 with loss of the lives of eight of the crew and injuries to twenty-four. Formal protest has been dispatched to General Francisco Franco, insurgent commander-in-chief. In today's move, the British government claimed the right to collect damages although terming the Hunter explosion an acci-
