Atlee Pomerene, Dead in Cleveland, Was Independent in Views

CLEVELAND, Nov. 15: (AP) — His close association with the White House resulted in the late Senator Pomerene's designation as the accredited representative of the president at the Democratic national convention at St. Louis in 1916, at which Mr. Wilson was renominated. During two terms in the Senate, Pomerene supported the Democratic position on many legislative matters of importance, but his independence in voting on others finally cost him much of his recognition as a Wilson spokesman in the Senate.

Senator Pomerene helped create the Federal Tariff Commission, which was opposed by the Democrats, advocated the Colombian treaty and Washington arms conference in the face of party opposition. He also voted for reservations to the Versailles Peace Treaty, but supported the League of Nations.

In the voting on the prohibition and woman suffrage amendments, Senator Pomerene was recorded in the negative.

When the Plumb plan for the control of the American railways was proposed, Senator Pomerene was the first Senator to openly oppose it. Because of his stand labor unions throughout the country opposed his election in 1922 and took much of the credit for his defeat by Senator Simeon D. Fess. He again sought to return to the Senate in 1926, but was defeated by the late Frank B. Willis.

Investigated Scandal

While engaged in the private practice of law at Cleveland, Mr. Pomerene again was brought into national prominence through his appointment by President Coolidge as counsel with Owen J. Roberts to prosecute the Teapot Dome and Elk Hills oil lease cases. The success of the government in recovering these valuable naval oil reserves added to the former senator's prestige and he gained some recognition as a candidate for the presidential nomination in 1928 but declined in favor of Al Smith.

Senator Pomerene was born at Berlin, Ohio, December 6, 1863. He attended the village schools and Vermillion Institute at Haverhill and was graduated in 1884 at Princeton University. Three years later he received a master of arts degree. Meanwhile he studied at the Cincinnati Law School and received his LL.B. degree in 1886. Admitted to the Ohio bar the same year, he began practice at Canton, where he also entered upon his political career.

On June 29, 1892, Senator Pomerene married Miss Mary H. Bockius of Canton, Ohio. They had no children.
