Up to last night twenty-one of the crew had been picked up, four bodies had been found-one dead of exposure and three by drowning-and three persons were unaccounted for and presumably drowned.

On sighting drifting persons or bodies, the naval planes dropped smoke bombs and the coastguard boats would proceed to the spot to pick them up.

to Take Stand Against "Treaty Breaker"-Declaration Adopted

Drive Against Nanking Starts

Defences Crumble Before Highly Trained and Mechanized Aggressors

BRUSSELS, Nov. 15: (CP)-With Italy alone dissenting and three Scandinavian countries abstaining from voting, the nine-power conference tonight accepted a declaration naming Japan as a treaty breaker in the Far East. The declaration was prepared by delegates of Great Britain, United States and France. It added that the Sino-! \ nese hostilities were affecting a ersely the material welfare of all nations and had aroused the horror and indignation of all people.

The Italian delegate, Count Luigi Aldrovandi - Marescotti said he must vote against the declaration because Italy believed it presaged a course which could only lead to complications.

has actively commenced its drive against Nanking, the Chinese capital. by starting the storming of General Chiang Kai Shek's "Hindenburg Line" fifty miles beyond Shanghai. Foreign observers declare that the Chinese defences are weakening rapidly from the Yangste River to Chekean Province before the highly trained and mechanized Japanese forces although the latter are outnumbered 200,000 to 400,000. This is but the opening of the drive on Nanking which is 125 miles beyond, Japanese officers declare.

Advices from Nanking said that Soochow had been desolated by more than seven hundred Japanese bombs being dropped within thirty hours.

In North China Japanese columns are reported close to Tsinan, capital of wealthy Shantung Province. Tsinan is the only provincial North China capital still uncaptur-
