PERCY PAGE TO RETIRE

No Games Planned for Grads Until International Series Next Spring

EDMONTON, Nov. 12: (CP)—J. Percy Page, famous coach of the world champion women's basketball team, Edmonton Grads, has announced he will probably retire after taking his quintet to the 1940 Olympic games in Tokyo. In the meantime he is confronted with the problem of finding competition in Canada.

When the Canadian Amateur Basketball Association broke away last spring from the Amateur Athletic Union, Grads retained affiliation with the union. The union holds the Canadian franchise from the international governing body for basketball so Grads could not play against United States teams unless linked with the union.

Exhibition games between Grads and other Canadian teams are not planned during the coming winter. Coach Page said the Albertans will not enter any competition until the usual series in defence of the Underwood International Challenge trophy next spring.

With Grads on the sidelines, enthusiastic competition for the Dominion title is expected to reappear during the coming season but Edmonton will not be out of the picture. Mr. Page said Graddettes, one of his farm teams, will be promoted to senior ranking and enter the Alberta playdowns. The third squad, Graddettes "B," will likely seek the intermediate title.

Tokyo in 1940
Grads, who have made exhibition tours in connection with the 1924, 1928, 1932 and 1936 Olympics, already are making preparations for another in conjunction with the games in Japan in 1940. Although without competition, Grads will hold regular practices throughout the coming winter. The Canadians have won easily all Olympic exhibition games and Mr. Page hopes they will retain their unbeaten record in 1940.

The Edmonton high school principal has the youngest team since he picked his first team in 1915. And the players proved their calibre by winning three tough series against crack United States squads last spring.

Meanwhile Coach Arnold Henderson is supervising workouts of 14 Graddettes, all anxious to be chosen to fill three vacancies on the Grad lineup. Maybe with the senior squad out of competition this winter, the vacancies will not be filled until spring.

Third cog in the Grad machine—Graddettes "B"—are getting into shape under supervision of Coach "Lare" Hollingsworth. Sixty-five players turned out for the first few practices but Coach Hollingsworth has cut the squad down to about 12.
