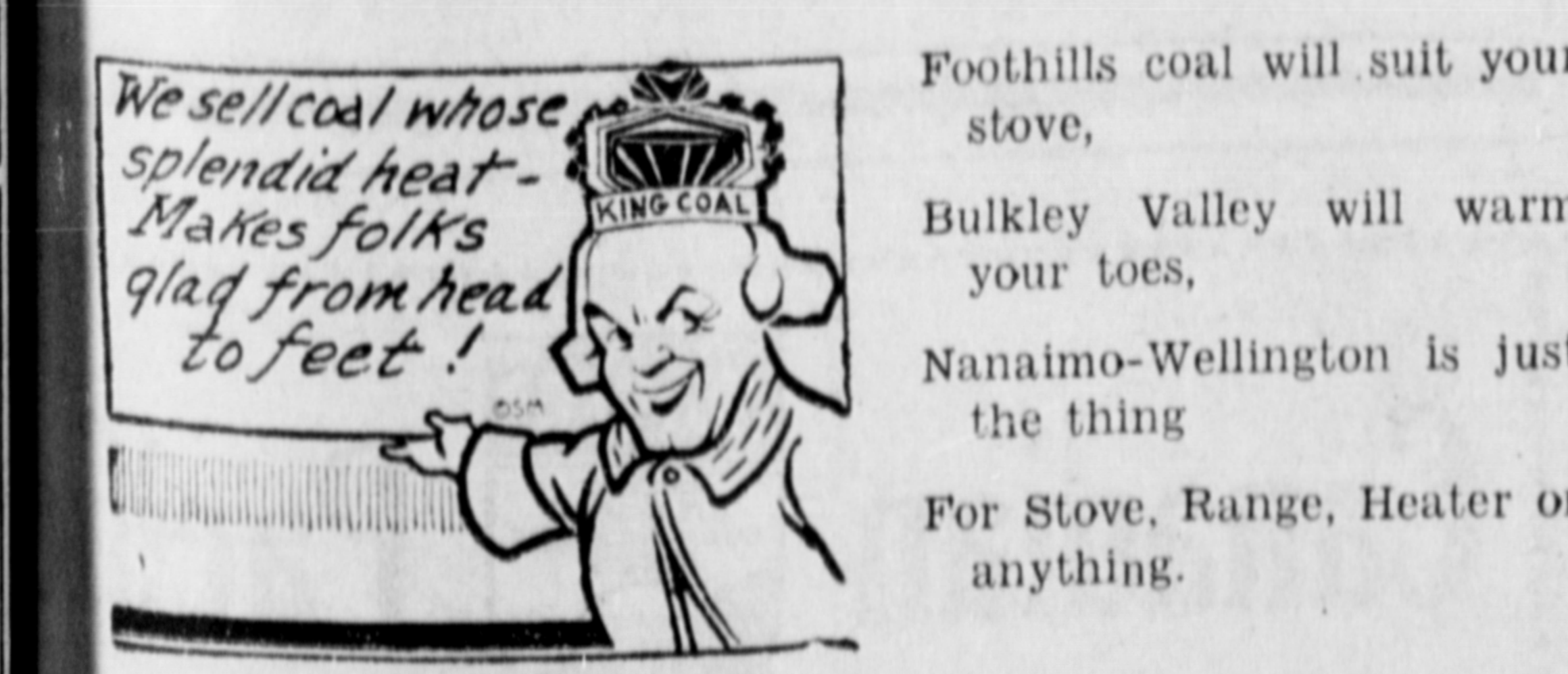
GOLD PRODUCTION UP

First Cold Snap Of Winter Here

Digby Island Records Freezing Point With Lower Readings on This Side Of Harbor

Prince Rupert is having its first cold snap of the winter. The lowest thermometer reading for the night, according to the meteorological station at Digby Island, was thirty-two degrees but it was undoubtedly considerably colder than that on this side of the harbor. A continuation of the present weather conditions or another day or so is forecast with a change probably by the week-end.

Throughout the district freezing temperatures are reported today, the daily report being as follows:

Triple Island—Clear, northwest wind, six miles per hour; sea smooth.
Langara Island—Clear, southeast wind, four miles per hour; barometer, 29.84; temperature, 37; sea smooth.

Dead Tree Point—Cloudy, light northwest wind; barometer, 29.83; temperature, 30; light swell.

Bull Harbor—Clear, calm; barometer, 29.76; temperature, 34; light swell.

Alert Bay—Clear, calm; barometer, 29.91; temperature, 32; sea smooth.

Estevan—Cloudy, northeast wind, four miles per hour; barometer, 29.72.

Vancouver—Cloudy, southeast wind, four miles per hour; barometer, 29.80.

Victoria—Cloudy, northeast wind, ten miles per hour; barometer, 29.78.

Prince George—Fair, calm; barometer, 29.94.

Terrace—Clear, north wind temperature, 24.

Alyansh—Clear, calm, 20.

Alice Arm—Clear, calm, 25.

Anyox—Clear, calm, 28.

Stewart—Clear, calm, 19.

Hazelton—Clear, calm, 16.

Smithers—Clear, calm, 10.
