trip in the world. Much more commercial advantage should be made of it. Particularly here in Prince Rupert could the longer days be capitalized.'

Mr. Maitland, who spoke entirely extemporaneously, had found his inspiration in an air trip from Vancouver which he had completed earlier in the day. He had travelled this coast very often, he said, but from the air he had seen beauties and potentialities of which he had never dreamed before. It gave one In entirely new feeling and was the cause of reflection along new lines. It imbued one with fresh courage. Surely great opportunities were being neglected. Who knew of the wealth that lay hidden in those countless mountains which one could see flung out as far as vision would permit? How many great industries, huge terminals and big cities might some day spring up?

People in Prince Rupert today might wonder if there was a chance for better things. If one looked back three hundred years what chance might have been seen anywhere in this country? The pioneers had courageously hewed their homes out of the wilderness. Possibly fifty or one hundred years from now the pioneer spirit of the people on the coast today might be also admired. Courage, ingenuity, enterprise and skill

were the great chance. He had been thrilled and inspired by the air trip, Mr. Maitland said, but, when in the distance far below he had seen the familiar red and black stack of a Union boat, he had found that, after all, it was with that little ship where his heart really was. This caused him to reflect on the romance and courage of the coast navigators from the early days, when no such modern devices and aids as were known today existed, up to the present time. There was courage and romance in the life of the coast navigator. The city dweller would start out with his car on a foggy evening, fearful of being out even on a city street, and board a coastal vessel where there was a sense of complete security in that one man who was complete master of the situation and on whose skill, knowledge and judgment all relied.

A Great Asset

Sea lore was an integral part of British Columbia. It was something that should be developed, proclaimed to the world and exploited commercially. Pending the development of the more material resources, it was something that could and should be made a great tangible asset—something which, if better known, could attract the whole world.

Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, president of the Gyro Club, was in the chair and fittingly thanked Mr. Maitland for his inspiring talk. There was a full attendance of members and several guests including G. W.
