Italian Official Describes Spanish Accusation as "Absurd and Bombastic"

Surprise Announcement Made by British Admiralty - Marauding Submarine Destroyed

LONDON, Oct. 12: (CP)- A Spanish government note at the end of the week claimed that a new Italian intervention in support of the insurgents in the Spanish civil war included "gas attacks on Spanish cities." An Italian embassy spokesman termjed the Spanish allegations as an "absurd and bombastic state

Following the Italian refusa! to consider withdrawal of volunteers from the Spanish civil war unless Germany is also invited to a conference at which that sub iect would be considered. France is reported to be making plans to open the Pyrenees passes to passage of men, munitions and supplies for the loyalist forces of Spain.

The loyalist government of Spain notified Great Britain and France vesterday that it was prepared to disselve all foreign volunteers in the civil war providing Italy would withdraw its volunteers from support of the insurgents.
