RUSSIAN PLANES MASSING TOKYO-The newspaper Hochi said today that 1500 Soviet planes have been massed in the maritime provinces part of Siberia nearest to Japan. It also said that 1900 Russian bombing planes were entering China by way of Sianfu in Shenshi Province. Further it is reported that the Russians are rushing submarine parts to Vladivostok where they are being assembled.

BIG PLANE MISSING HUDSON, Ont. - Pilot Ken Smith and probably ten persons are missing on a flight between Pickle Lake and Sioux Lookout. Smith left Wednesday for a 125mile flight to Sioux Lookout and has not been reported since. He was accompanied by Chief Engineer Keith Gregson of the Starratt Airways which operated the plane. With them were several passengers, the exact number being unknown. The plane had a capacity for nine. Company officials think that poor weather may have forced the ship down with a safe landing, probably at Root Portage camp, 65 miles north of here. Pilot Len Fraser left this afternoon to search for the missing plane. Weather conditions had previously prevented a search plane leaving.
