NEW HOMES FOR PRAIRIE FARMERS

There are many districts in the drought areas of Saskatchewan and Alberta where the innabitants are going to be obliged to move out. There are many districts in British Columbia where the government owns good land that is not occupied and will not be occupied for many years under ordinary conditions. It should be the duty of the governments concerned to get together on some kind of an arrangement whereby these people can be transpianted to locations where they have some hope for the tuture. It is by no fault of their own that they are obliged to leave their lands and buildings and move into a new country without enough means to get improved lands. Even if they had some funds, it would be considered hardship for them in getting started in a new land. They should, therefore, be given new land in their new location and also given some assistance in getting started. The country will be repaid many fold in a few years by the result of the business that will come from having these experienced and industrious people in a happy and satisfied frame of mind and in prosperous circumstances.

It is suggested that it might even be a good idea for the government to gather up a lot of the discontents of this province and plant them in Saskatchewan and Alberta until they have time to figure out what complaints they really have in living in the best province in the Dominion of Canada.

Some of the dried out farmers have been investigating conditions in Central British Columbia. Possibly this would be the best available location for re-settlement of these people who have been unfortunate enough to choose wrong locations in the arid southern section of the Canadian prairies.

GOOD WORK OF YOUNG RANGERS

One of the chief features of the welcome to Lord Tweedsmuir at Burns Lake was his initiation into honorary membership in the Young Rangers, an organization of young people banded together to prevent and fight fires in the forest sections of the country. It is a secret organization with all the usual paraphernalia connected therewith but with the one definite object above all others. In a country which is dry during much of the summer and where fires are a distinct danger to the whole community, such an organization can prove very useful and the idea might well be adopted at other similar localities.
