TORONTO, April 14: (CP)-Premier Mitchell Hepburn today dictated a letter calling for the resignations of Hon. David Croll, minister of labor, and Hon. Arthur Roebuck, Attorney General. He asks the ministers to step out because of their apparent disagreement with him in his stand against the Committee for Industrial Organization activity in the Oshawa General Motors strike. The Premier told his secretary to have the letter dictated immediately. He said he would not confer with Croll and Roebuck before the resignation demand was presented.

VICTORIA, April 14: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo announced yesterday that negotiations have been completed between the British Columbia and federal governments for a joint public works program with total expenditures running to \$1,700,000.

One million dollars will be used in construction of main roads and another will be allocated for mining trails.

In addition, the province will shortly allocate its

\$3,000,000 loan, mainly on roads. Another \$1,800,000 will be spent on maintenance.
