Buckley an- Baseball Standings nounced that a company recently organized, is planning! to erect a modern sulpnite pulp min, which will manufacture pulp suitable for the manufacture of rayon. This mill is to be located in Prince Rupert and it is understood it has strong financial backing from Eastern Canadian interests.

An announcement of a somewhat similar nature was made two years ago but evidently the promoters were misled in the matter of financial support and it did not come to fruition. Today there is a change in the situation. The rayon market is steadily increasing and the demand for the product seems likely to grow and the price advance. The use of rayon is spreading and almost every day scientists are finding that it can be used in undreamed of ways.

Mr. Buckley has had a difficult task in organizing. All sorts of obstacles have been overcome and he has succeeded in interesting capital sufficient to float the big industry. Great credit is coming to him for the persis-l tance and courage he has shown.
