Budget is Passed EDMONTON, June 15: (CP)-Speaker Dawson rescued the Alberta Social Credit government from defeat last night when he ruled out of order a Social Credit legislator's motion to terminate on a year's notice the Dominionprovincial agreement whereby Alberta is policed by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The motion had passed 23 to 20 against the vote of every cabinet minister.

Earlier the government's budget was passed removing the immediate cause of an insurgent threat which almost wrecked the Aberhart government in April.
