

Robert Underwood Johnson Was With Allies All Through Great War

NEW YORK, Oct. 19: (AP)-The late Robert Underwood Johnson, who died here at the week-end, was a strong advocate of peace and arbitration and the union of Christian effort. He stood for the national spirit as against all forms of sectionalism and vigorously opposed lawlessness carried on under the guise of support for various movements. 
