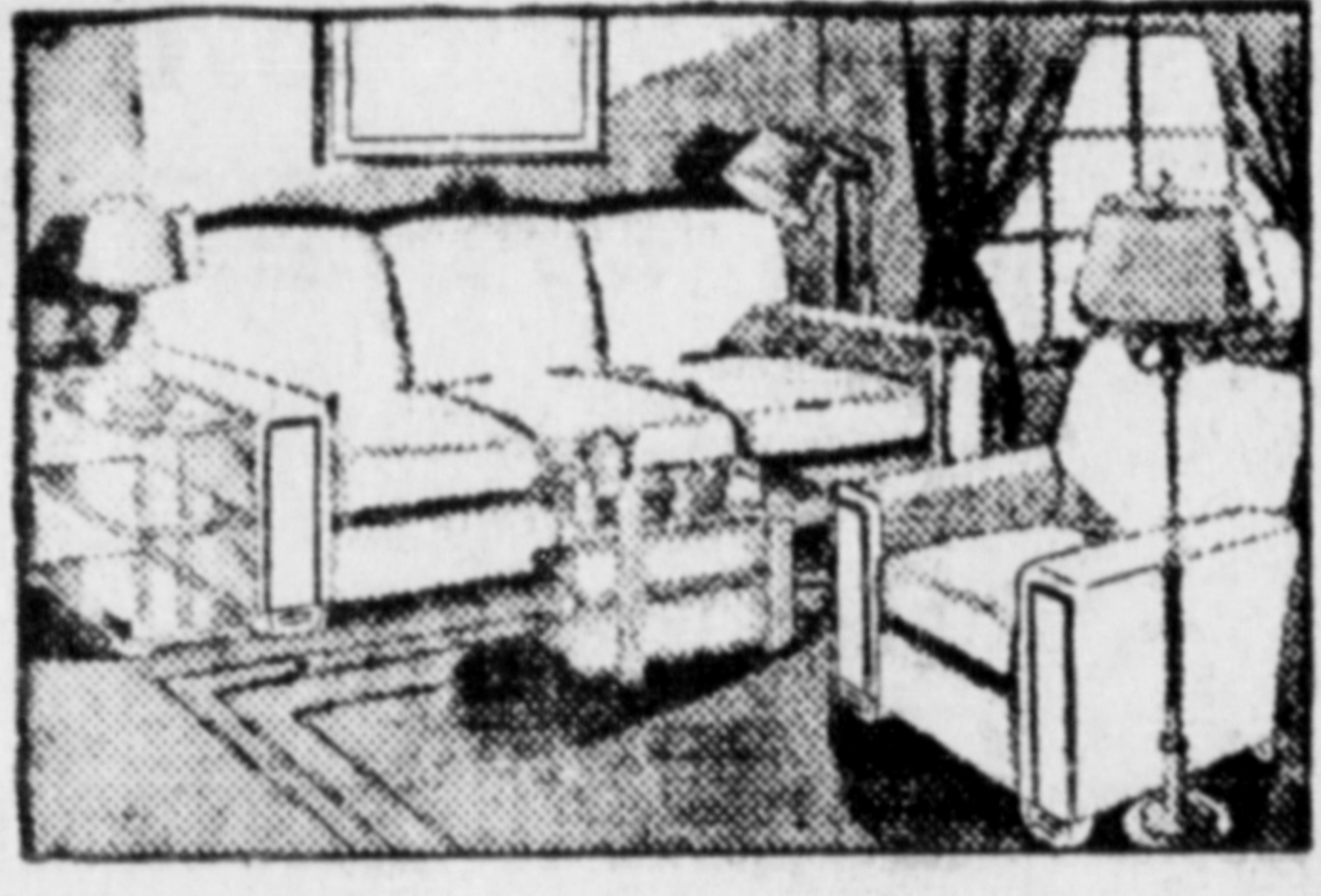

HIS IDEALS WERE HIGH

Robert Underwood Johnson Was With Allies All Through Great War

NEW YORK, Oct. 19: (AP)—The late Robert Underwood Johnson, who died here at the week-end, was a strong advocate of peace and arbitration and the union of Christian effort. He stood for the national spirit as against all forms of sectionalism and vigorously opposed lawlessness carried on under the guise of support for various movements. Copyright reform and forest conservation were subjects to which he devoted much time and in which he attained the objects for which he worked.

From the beginning of the World War, Dr. Johnson was outspoken in his attitude against the Central Powers and during the war published many poems in praise of the different countries grouped in the Allies and in appreciation of the entry of the United States into the conflict. He had displayed especial interest in Italy and the people of that country and after the war his appointment as American ambassador to Rome was received with general satisfaction throughout Italy.

Born In Washington

Dr. Johnson was born January 12, 1853, at Washington, in a house that has been replaced by the rotunda of the House of Representatives office building. His father was the late Judge Nimrod H. Johnson who, besides being an able lawyer and jurist of Indiana, was widely known for his knowledge of history, poetry and general literature. To him the son owed his literary temperament and predilections. Dr. Johnson's mother was Catherine C. Underwood Johnson.

The boyhood of Dr. Johnson was spent at Centerville, Ind., where he received his early education. He then matriculated at Earlham College, a Quaker institution at Richmond, where he was graduated at 18 as a bachelor of science. He immediately entered business in Chicago as a clerk in the western agency of the Scribner Educational Books.

After two years he became connected with the editorial staff of Scribner's Monthly, afterwards the Century Magazine. In 1881, Dr. Johnson was advanced to associate editor and, on the death of R. G.

Business Changes In Smithers Made

Ladies' Wear and Butcher Shops Have New Owners Now

SMITHERS, Oct. 19:—Two business houses in Smithers changed hands last week when the ladies' wear store conducted by Mrs. W. L. Grant was sold to Mrs. E. Duff of Smithers and the meat market operated by Roy Pope was sold by him to Harry Attree of Terrace. Business is going on as usual at both places under the new management.

Following the sale of the Grant store, Mr. and Mrs. Grant and family departed for Vancouver where they will take up residence.

Mr. Pope expects to remain at Smithers and will continue to operate his farm near town.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Today is the final date for halibut fishing in Area No. 3 prior to the commencement of the close season at midnight. There is only one Canadian boat out in Area No. 3, this being the Sea Maid, Capt. Henry Doiron, which should be in any time now. There are a number of American boats still out in Area No. 3 and some of these may land their catches here although it is not likely there will be many. It will be well into next week, it is expected, before all the American boats are in.

Halibut landings were heavy at Seattle yesterday with ten Area No. 3 vessels landing catches totalling 354,000 pounds as follows: Neptune, 40,000 pounds, Whiz, 9³/₄ and 9c; Liberty, 39,000, Ripley, 10³/₄ and 9c; Estep, 25,000, Chase, 9¹/₄ and 9c; Bernice, 24,000, McCallum, 10¹/₄ and 9c; Lituya, 32,000, Washington, 9³/₄ and 9c; Rio Rita, 40,000, Booth, 9³/₄ and 9c; Addington, 25,000, New England, 9¹/₄ and 9c; Havana, 39,000, San Juan, 10c and 9c; Eldorado, 50,000, Sebastian, 10¹/₄ and 9c; Celtic, 40,000, MacCallum, 9³/₄ and 9c. Cod vessels from Area No. 2 also sold small incidental halibut catches at 11c.

On her way south after a special voyage to Skagway to pick up an overflow of passengers from Alaska and the Yukon, C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, arrived in port at 7:30 this morning from the north and sailed an hour later for Vancouver. The vessel's passenger accommodation was completely filled and she had no room for passengers from here.

Smithers Produce For Saskatchewan

Carload of Vegetables Left Saturday—Second now being assembled

SMITHERS, Oct. 19:—The car of vegetables which has been collected in the district between Hazelton and Houston went forward from Smithers Saturday. It contained 27 tons for the relief of the Hoosier district in Saskatchewan, that being the place to which the car has been consigned.

There were eighteen tons of potatoes, two tons of carrots, five tons of turnips, one ton of cabbage and a ton of mixed vegetables together with a considerable collection of preserved fruits, canned vegetables, pickles, honey and clothing, both new and used.

Vegetables are still coming in from all over the district and from Cedarvale, Woodcock and Kitwanga and the collection of a second car load has been commenced. The car which was loaded at Terrace with fruit and vegetables passed through Smithers Saturday morning on its way to Saskatchewan.

WINNIPEG WHEAT

WINNIPEG, Oct. 19: (CP)—Wheat prices were off 3/4c to 7/8c per bushel on the Winnipeg market yesterday.

The plant will be somewhat similar to those of other fuel companies on the waterfront.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, returned to port at 2:45 this afternoon from Stewart, Anyox and other northern points and is sailing at 3:15 for Vancouver and waypoints.

No boats being in with catches there was no sale of halibut on the local Fish Exchange today.
