Timely Recipes

SPICED GRAPE JELLY

Wash slightly under-ripe grapes, remove the stems. Put grapes in a preserving kettle, allowing 1/2 cup vinegar, 1 teaspoon whole cloves, and 1/2 stick cinnamon to 4 cups grapes. Cook together 5 minutes. Strain through double cheesecloth or flannel jelly bag. Measure juice. Allow 1 cup sugar to each cup of juice. Boil until a little of the juice jellies when poured on a cold saucer (15-20 minutes). Pour into hot sterilized glasses. Cool and seal.

Fourth victim of the Grand Central fire, Robert Cooper, succumbed yesterday to burns. Three other men had been burned to death.

BOARD IS SUGGESTED

Advisory Committee on Schools Suggested by Trades and Labor Council

The Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council has endorsed and will support the convention of labor unions to be held at Victoria at the end of the month.

The council feels that it would be beneficial to teachers, parents and pupils if there was a representative voluntary committee acting as school board, this committee not to have control of finances but to act in an advisory capacity. The City Commissioner will be asked to endorse this measure.

A protest from the Vancouver Pressmen's Association regarding the printing of text books outside of the province has been endorsed. Commenting on the vast sums of money being expended on defence measures, the council went on record as favoring the building of a recreation centre as a means of building up the health of our young people rather than the building of armories. Gratification was expressed at observance in Saturday's press that Commissioner Alder has already made a suggestion in that direction.

It being reported that several employers were not observing the Hours of Work Act and the Minimum Wage Act, it was suggested that, in the near future, prosecutions might result. J. M. Campbell is the government inspector for this city and he is empowered to act in such cases.

Fire Hall matters came up for discussion. It being ascertained that the department is being operated with a reduced personnel those in charge will be questioned on the efficiency of same.

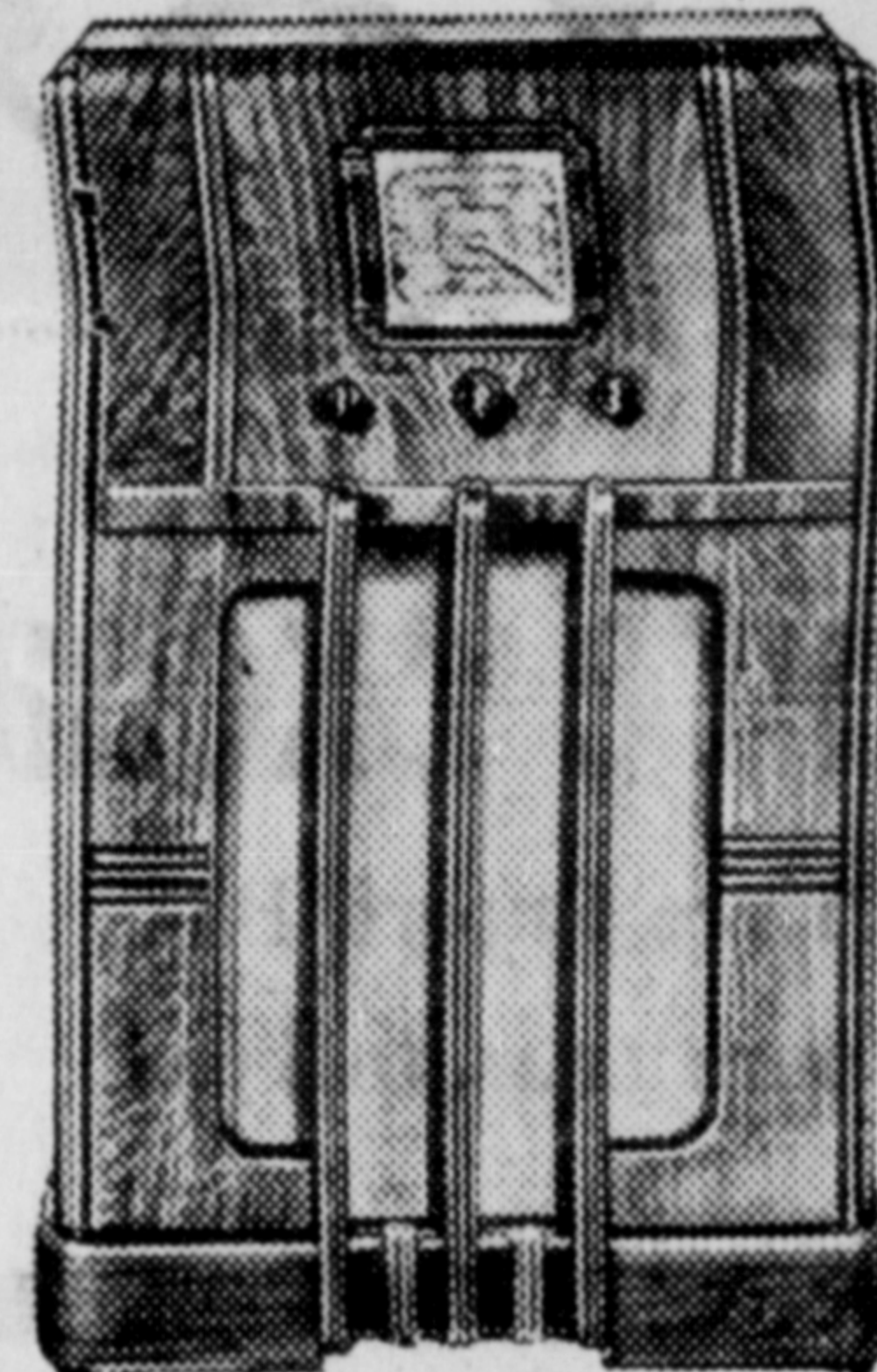

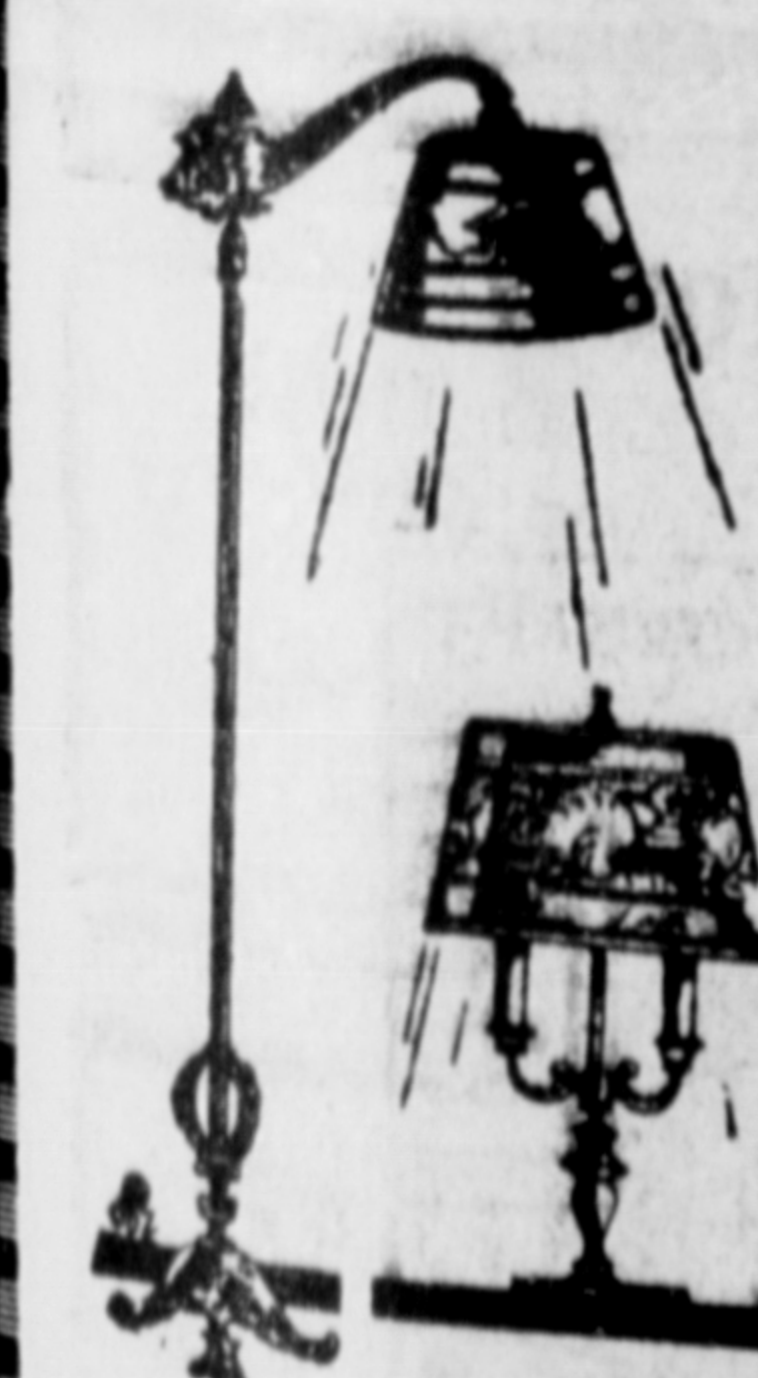
