Holocaust in Chesapeake Bay When 96 people Had to Take to Water to Save Their Lives From Burning Ship

BALTIMORE, July 30:-All but four of the 94 passengers and crew driven by flames from the liner City of Baltimore in a night horror on Chesapeake Bay, reached land with stories of amazing rescues. Of the four unaccounted for, two are known to be dead.

The liner became a floating furnace late yesterday when fourteen miles from Baltimore. The pilot boat William D. Sanner rescued 61 persons.

The vessel is now nothing but a floating hulk.
