SMITHERS CREAMERY

New Industrial Plant for Interior Town is Contemplated

SMITHERS, Aug. 28:—A creamery for the Bulkley Valley is a prospect for the immediate future as a result of a largely attended meeting held in the Municipal Hall at Smithers Wednesday evening.

Mr. Whittaker of Saskatoon has been in the district for several days looking over the situation and is satisfied that a creamery is not only a feasible proposition for the district but he was very pleased with the prospects of building up a fine business along that line. He was greatly impressed with the amount of feed in the Bulkley Valley and the abundance of good water and the opportunities for farming successfully. He is a man of great experience from the manufacturing and from the management point of view and no doubt will be able to turn out a good local product that will meet with a good acceptance along the line.

Over 40 farmers and business men attended the meeting and, while some were naturally skeptical of the undertaking, the majority were enthusiastic in support of the movement and voted to assist in getting it started. A committee was appointed to take charge of the matter temporarily and Mr. Whittaker left this morning to return to Saskatoon.
