VICTORIA, Nov. 30:-Under an act to amend the Hospital Act which is being introduced in the Legislature by E. E. Winch, C.C.F. member for Burnaby, every hospital in the province would be required to employ one graduate nurse for every five beds. The working day of all hospital employees would be imited to eight hours.


