FILL UP VACANT PLACES

There is a growing feeling throughout Canada that the vacant farm lands near the railways should be filled up with a good class of settlers. It is pointed out that the years when Canada had the heaviest immigration were the days when the country was most prosperous.

It is quite understandable that labor should fear the influx of too many people from other countries. There is no suggestion that the immigration bars should be taken down. Canada does not have to take any people who offer. What is needed is selected immigrants from countries friendly to the British Empire and men and women who will make good citizens. Chiefly the people who come to the country should be those wishing to go on the land.

Speaking at the convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Dr. W. J. Black, director of colonization and agriculture for the Canadian National Railways, urged the admission of farmers from the United States. He also would let down the bars for selected immigrants from a few European countries.

POLITICS GETTING HOT



THREE GAME MARGIN NOW

New York Giants Break Even With Brooklyn Dodgers While Chicago Cubs are Losing to St. Louis

BROOKLYN, Sept. 10: (CP)—New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers shared honors in a double-header here yesterday and, with the second place Chicago Cubs losing to the St. Louis Cardinals, the margin of leadership of the Giants in the National League was increased to three full games.

In the American League the leading New York Yankees dropped a heavy-hitting decision to the Boston Red Sox and had their margin of leadership cut from ten and a half games over the Detroit Tigers who were winning a class victory over the Cleveland Indians. The Red Sox took exclusive possession of the leadership of the second division after having been tied for fifth place with the Indians.

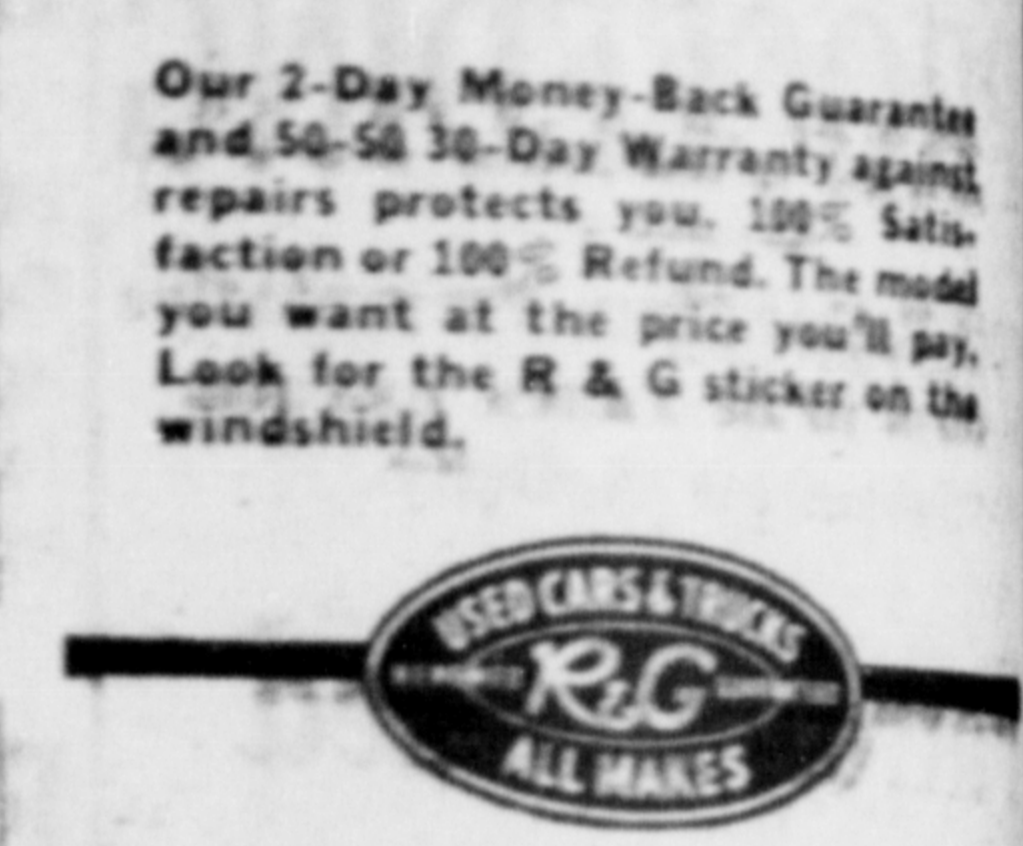
