

The Hon. E. G. Prior became Premier of British Columbia in November, 1902. He was selected to continue the government formerly headed by the Hon. James Dunsmuir, following the latter's resignation. A few months later, charges brought against the Premier in the House, in connection with the previous awarding of contracts to a firm of which it was alleged the Hon. Mr. Prior was financially interested. Regardless o whether the charges justified it or not, the Premier shortly resigned. He was succeeded by the Hon. Richard McBride.
