


CAMPBELL AND WOOD MAY START INTERNATIONAL SPEEDBOAT RIVALRY



Since Sir Malcolm Campbell of England turned his attention to speedboat racing, there has loomed the possibility of international rivalry between the British speed king and Gar Wood, American speedboat driver, held the water record for some time, but since Campbell raced his new boat over the measured mile, he no longer can claim the record because Sir Malcolm states he achieved a speed of 125.798 m.p.h. This layout shows the two speedboats and their drivers. Bluebird, Sir Malcolm's boat, named after his famous racing car in which he set the land speed record, is seen at top, prior to being launched in Switzerland for his speed test. THE OLIVE BRANCH

Premier Mussolini and Chancellor Hitler have held out the olive branch to Great Britain and France, following the lead of Premier Neville Chamberlain of Great Britain. They say they will seek the friendship of Britain and then of France.

Britain is a democracy but not communistically inclined. She dislikes many of the things for which Mussolini and Hitler stand but she is still close to the people of Italy and Germany. Nothing but good can come of friendship with these countries. Friendship is always a good thing, much better than enmity.

France is a country of small landowners and is not normally socialistic. Her governments are usually socialist by name but they have shown little tendency to carry out socialist policies. Her next swing should, according to the natural order of things, be to the right.

The recent speeches of the two dictators have decreased the European tension and it is hoped that all four countries concerned will take further steps to cement their friendship. Britain will, as the most powerful of the quartet, have a restraining influence on the others in helping to keep the peace.

BETTING IN ONTARIO

The betting on the elections in Ontario seems to favor the return of Premier Mitchell Hepburn with a reduced majority. The election takes place next Wednesday and nobody can be sure what will happen although the odds just now seem to be with the Premier. If he wins it will be a blow at the C.I.O. organization which seems to be somewhat on the wane. Some people consider it will be a blow at Mackenzie King but the federal prime minister has announced that he will vote for Hepburn. He could hardly do otherwise unless he changes his mind after he gets into the polling booth.
