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



CAMPBELL AND WOOD MAY START INTERNATIONAL SPEEDBOAT RIVALRY



Since Sir Malcolm Campbell of England turned his attention to speedooat racing, there has loomed the possibility of international rivalry between the British speed king and Gar Wood, Wood, American speedboat driver, held the water record for some time, but since Campbell raced his new boat over the measured mile, he no longer can claim the record because Sir Malcolm states he achieved a speed of 125.798 m.p.h. This layout shows the two speedboats and their drivers. Bluebird, Sir Malcolm's boat, named after his famous racing car in which he set the land speed record, is seen at top, prior to being launched in Switzerland for his speed test.
