OUTLET TO RUPERT IS OPPOSED

Sir Edward Beatty Does Not Favor Port and Would Build to Vancouver

In an interview with the representative of the Peace River Record Sir Edward Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, is reported as saying: "The development of the north has reached a point where more complete transportation facilities are required and, if the board of managers of the Northern Alberta Railways approves of plans now being prepared, work on the survey will be under way in the spring."
 "Your people have been waiting many years for the realization of an outlet to the coast. Let me say this, that for several years now financial conditions have made impossible any new developments. Governments as well as railways have not found it possible to balance their budgets. But conditions are now improving, and we trust that it will not be long now until financial conditions will be such as to permit of this undertaking. I cannot say that I agree with representations that have been made from Peace River that such a coast outlet should be constructed to Prince Rupert. But I do say that your country here does need an outlet to the coast, and that it should be to an established port. Vancouver has already been established and is rapidly growing in to one of the most important ports on the entire Pacific Coast. Vancouver considers the Peace River country as her own hinterland, and wants to trade with this area. We recognize the need and I believe it will not be long until your hopes in this regard are realized. They will be just as soon now as improvement in financial conditions permit. Even were we not to build it, the necessity is such that if we did not someone else would provide that outlet."
 Speaking on the great development that is taking place in the northern mining areas, Sir Edward was equally optimistic regarding pending developments. "Present demands are such that traffic for the north cannot be handled by air services entirely, and even water transportation this year has apparently not fully met all requirements. The north will soon require rail transportation, and when it is undertaken it will probably be jointly by the C.P.R. and the National. During the next few years there will be a lot of joint construction," he added.
