Basque Army, Little More Than Remnant, Endeavors to Stay Advance of Insurgents

Four Power Break

Germany Claims Ships Are Still Being Attacked-Russia Critical of Committee

CASTRO URDIALES, Spain, June (CP)-Exposed to ceaseless sea and bombing from the air, tattered remnants of the Basque army have entrenched themselves in the Galdames Mountains for a fight to save Santander from the fate of Bilbao, their lost capital, from which they were driven by the insurgents on Saturday. Santander is forty-five miles west of Bilbao. Meantime the insurgents are launching a drive on Santander from near which place the Bilbao water supply comes.

As thousands of insurgent soldiers paraded the streets of Bilbao, the loyalists sought revenge by a counter-bombing of the city from the air. Insurgent planes engaged them in combat and it was estimated that half a dozen machines were brought down in flames.

Last night several insurgent soldiers were killed when loyalist sappers, digging under Bilbao, exploded a huge mine.

With 300,000 civilians said to be virtually starving, martial law has! been declared in Bilbao.

German Ships Attacked BERLIN, June 22: (CP) Germany has postponed the impending visit to London of Baron Konastantin von Neurath, Foreign Minister, because it was announced the "situation created by repeated THREE DEAD Spanish attacks on German warships" required his presence in Berlin. A Havas News Agency dispatch declared last night that Germany intended to avenge the alleged attack by a Spanish government submarine on the cruiser Leipzig off the coast of Algeria a week ago with even more drastic military action than when the cruiser Deutschland was recently

attacked. The Spanish loyalists have denied attacking the Leipzig.
