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Ripples on Surface of Hospital Board; Echoes of Controversy Heard

Brown asserted. Mr. Tinker thought it had been an "unethical thing" to publish the report without having discussed the matter with the board. It had looked to him like propaganda.

Mr. Alder replied that he had deliberately caused the report to be published in his capacity as city commissioner. He felt that it had been in the interests of all to have it published. There was a grave responsibility not only upon himself but on every member of the board and he did not consider it wise to let it go further.

Mr. Wilkinson could not see what advantage there had been in publishing the report.

At this juncture Miss Harrison entered the discussion with the assertion that the hospital was today no more a fire trap than it had been twelve years ago when she came here. In fact the building was better than it had been then.

"Do you take issue with the fire marshal's report?" asked Mr. Alder whereupon Miss Harrison was ruled out of the discussion as not being a member of the board.

Mr. Macdonald said that the board had felt it in the best interests of the people that the report should be kept secret. The board had been doing all possible to get a new hospital. He felt that, before publishing the report, the commissioner should have taken the board into his confidence. Undoubtedly, of course, the commissioner had the right to publish it. He had felt that the report was so alarming that no good purpose could be served in causing it to be published.

Mr. Alder thought it had been absolutely essential to let the people know about the report before they voted on any hospital project. He still contended that they could not afford to shut their eyes to the report. He was willing to take responsibility for everything he had done. The idea of a new hospital was his one object. He had realized that everything must be done to get women and children off that second floor. After all the thing would only meet an emergency and, if there was a chance to get a complete new building, he thought it should be jumped at.

Mr. MacCallum believed that Mr. Alder had been sincere in causing publication of the report. Other views had been published on the whole matter and in that connection he (Mr. MacCallum) wondered what and who might have been really behind some of the letters. One particular letter he referred to—not the one in which his name had been mentioned personally.

Canvassing For Members

The question of canvassing for members before the meeting which was to have considered the offer of the Sisters of St. Ann was also discussed. This was brought up by Mr. MacCallum.

Miss Harrison said she had refused to permit the nurses to go out canvassing. What the employees might do after hours, of course, she could not be responsible for. In regard to the activities of one member of the staff, who was singled out, Miss Harrison remarked: "She had as much right to canvass as the other side had to canvass in the beer parlors."

There, apparently, had been activity on both sides in enrolling members, said Mr. MacCallum. It had been suggested, in view of the increased members, that directors might resign. Mr. Brown and Mr. Macdonald saw no necessity for this.

Board to Issue Statement

In regard to last week's controversy, it was decided, on motion of G. V. Wilkinson, seconded by Mr. Macdonald, that a statement of the board's stand should be prepared for publication. This statement will be prepared by G. P. Tinker, W. M. Brown and H. W. Birch and, before it is published, it would be approved by the board at a special meeting.

The board had been criticized said Mr. Wilkinson, for not making a public statement on the matter of the Sisters of St. Ann offer.

Mr. Dibb did not see where any action of the board was at issue in the controversy. The minutes which had been read at the meeting revealed the views of the members of the board and what had transpired at the board meetings.

Mr. Tinker thought the board was to be complimented upon the manner in which the situation had been handled.

Mr. Macdonald pointed out that all resolutions of the board at the special meetings last week had been unanimous. It had been agreed to recommend a plebiscite.

Campaign For Funds

In regard to reviving the campaign to raise \$30,000 for a new hospital, Mr. Dibb felt that, in view of the recent controversy, it might be well to let the proposition rest for a time. Other members of the board, however, felt that, in view of the report of the fire marshal, there should be no undue delay in taking action. The consensus of opinion was that the meeting of representatives to consider ways and means for raising the money necessary to build a new wing should be held at as early a date as possible.
