## SALE OF SECTION TWO LOTS STARTED OFF WELL

### MONEY CAN'T PAY FOR BLOOD

Stern Words Used by Mr. Justice Riddell in Sentencing a Merchant to Prison for Criminal Offense.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Toronto, Nov. 30.—A surprise was caused at the Toronto Assizes here today when Mr. Justice Riddell, sent Roy F. Brintnell, a well-to-do Yonge Street merchant to the Central prison for seven months. Brintnell was found guilty of wilful neglect in running down and killing Mrs. Sauter, an aged lady, with his automobile.

A number of prominent Toronto merchants got up a petition bearing 8000 names and asking that a fine be imposed, and presented it to the judge. "I cannot accede to this request," said the

### FIRST LOT SOLD FOR \$1,200

It Was a Choice Double Corner on Atlin Avenue Close to the Overhead Approach of the Government Waterfrontage ---Looks as if High Prices Will Be Secured

About forty thousand dollars was realized by the sale of Section Two lots this morning before twelve-thirty, when the sale was adjourned for lunch.

Lot 37, Block 1, the first lot which came under the hammer, fetched \$1200. It was the double corner on Atlin Avenue where the overhead crossing will be giving access to the Government

waterfrontage, and was bought by Aldermen Kirkpatrick and Clayton. Lot 38 fetched \$950; 39, \$850; and 40 went for \$715. Lot 40 marked the point where the bidders wavered off into \$5 bids.

The biggest price in the morning was obtained for lots 1 and 2, block 6, which fetched \$2775

each; Lots 23 and 24, Block 4, which went for \$2075; Lots 1 and 2, Block 3, realized \$2380 each, and Lots 17 and 18, Block 4, \$1610 each. A great many lots fetched over \$1000 and no lot went for less than \$625 of those sold this morning. As some 42 lots were sold realizing roughly \$38,670, the average price works out to close on \$1000 per lot.

### SHOCKING DISCOVERY IN DOWN TOWN HOTEL TODAY

Body of John Kelemet Discovered Still Warm and With a Terribly Gashed Throat in a Pool of Blood in his Room This Morning

Dead, but still warm, and with a shocking gash in his throat, John Kelemet was found in his room at the Queen's Hotel at 11.30 this morning by Manager George Poppadolos who had the room door forced. Dr. Tremayne was instantly summoned, but Kelemet was beyond aid. Information was at once given the police, and Constable Hamblin with Chief Vickers reached the scene and had the body searched.

A new razor with which

the deed had been done was taken from the room. The case is evidently one of suicide, Kelemet having evidently cut his own throat in swift determined manner without even taking off his collar.

Papers found on the body along with \$51 in cash, show that he came on the Cetriana from Vancouver on the 26th. Deceased was a member of the Western Federation of Miners, having joined at Nome in August, 1908. An inquest will be held tonight at 8 p.m.

### POPE PIUS X CONFERS HIGH HONORS UPON THREE AMERICAN PRELATES

At Great Consistory Held in the Vatican, Archbishop Farley, Archbishop O'Connell and Mgr. Falconio are Made Cardinals—Archbishop Bourne is Created Cardinal for England

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Rome, Nov. 30.—At a Consistory held at the Vatican yesterday, the Pope conferred the red hat, the sign of cardinalship on twenty-two leading clergies. Among those honored were three from America, Archbishop John Murphy Farley, of New York, Archbishop W. M. O'Connell, of Boston, and Mgr. Diomed Falconio, Papal delegate at Washington.

Cardinal for England.

Archbishop Bourne, of Westminster, was also created a Cardinal, thus re-establishing the English See, which has been vacant since the death of Cardinal Vaughan in 1903. This removes a great grievance under which

English Roman Catholics have labored.

Cardinal Farley

Cardinal Farley has been a priest for forty years. He is a native of Armagh, Ireland, but has lived in America most of his life. In 1884 he was private Chamberlain to Pope XIII. He has been archbishop of New York for nine years.

Cardinal O'Connell.

Cardinal O'Connell is the only American born and the youngest of the American cardinals. He was born at Lowell, Mass., fifty-two years ago. He distinguished

himself in 1905 by a special mission to Japan. As a result of his negotiations with the Mikado the Catholic Church was placed on good terms with the Japanese Government, and the see of Boston was his reward.

Cardinal Falconio.

Cardinal Falconio will be remembered by Canadian Catholics as the papal delegate who visited the Dominion in 1889. He has been serving in Washington since 1902. Cardinal Falconio has his mother to thank for the great honor Pope Pius has conferred on him, as it was his mother, a peasant woman, who urged her son to enter the priesthood.

### ALDERMAN DECLARES THAT CONTRACT RIGHTFULLY BELONGED TO THE "NEWS"

Question of Advertising of Assessment Schedules Came Up Again in Council Last Night—Alderman Newton Insists That "The Daily News" Was the Lowest Legitimate Tenderer—Ruled Out of Order by Mayor

"Moved by Ald. Newton, seconded by Ald. Douglas, that fresh tenders be called for Section 4 Local Improvement Notices."

The above motion was put by Alderman Newton at the Council meeting last night. He claimed that the News and Empire were

misled as to the condition under which the advertising had to appear and that the giving of the contract to the Journal was illegal, as the Daily Journal was not in existence at the time the contract was awarded.

"By all that is fair and by all

that is legal," said Alderman Newton, finally, "the Daily News was entitled to that contract I am not here for myself alone, but for fair and square dealing with the public."

The Mayor referred the matter to the City Solicitor, who was

quite ready to give his opinion offhand that the contract was legally awarded to the Journal.

"I dispute that," said Alderman Newton. "I have all respect for City Solicitor Peter's opinion, but when he gives us that kind of gush I have no use for it."

Mr. Peters objected to his advice being styled "gush," and after an hour's wrangling the Mayor finally ruled Alderman Newton out of order, and adjourned the meeting.

### ALD. MORRISSEY PROTESTS AGAINST CIVIC LAW-SUITS

Says That City is Fighting a Losing Battle Against the Contractors and the Mayor and Aldermen Know It

At the city council meeting last night, just before adjournment Alderman Morrissey entered a strong protest against the pressing by the City of the defence in the lawsuits entered by the various contractors over the grading of Section One. He declared that every alderman present was personally convinced that the City was going to fight a losing battle, and the result of it would be the publication to the detriment of Prince Rupert throughout the length and breadth of the continent of those legal proceedings.
