"Mike" May Aid Natural Speech

B.B.C. Expert Has Suggestion For Cure of "Parsonic Voice"

LONDON, Aug. 10: (CP) - In stallation of microphones as a cure for "parsonic voice" has been suggested by Prof. Lloyd James, linguistic adviser to the British Broadcasting Corporation.

He said the trouble was not altogether the parson's fault. He was obliged to raise his voice and speak slowly in order to fill the vast space of some churches. Frequently there was also musical accompaniment restricting his rise of pitch and then his voice tended to become artificial so that the man-in-the-street lost sympathy with the clergyman.

"It is possible," Prof. James said, "the installation of microphones and loudspeakers in our churches would encourage the clergy to become more natural in their speech and to use language of ordinary life. The idea there is a special form of speech behavior appropriate to the Diety is a mediaeval idea and one that must be exploded."


