Waterfront Whiffs

Salmon Fishing of All Types Closes in Most Areas at End of Next Week—Halibut Prices Good—Otto Young Due in London

With the exception of the Queen Charlotte Islands, Smith's Inlet and Rivers Inlet chum salmon seining areas, salmon fishing of all types will close in Prince Rupert district on September 24. Recently there has been an improvement in the chum run on the Queen Charlotte Islands. The run of this variety in other areas, however, is not amounting to much. Canneries remaining in operation in the district late in September to pack chums are Inverness, Cassiar, Carlisle and Claxton on the Skeena River, Butedale, Klemtu, Namu and Goose Bay down the coast and Legoon Bay on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

The final clearance date for Area No. 3 having been set as midnight, September 29, expectations are that scattered landings of halibut will continue to be made at Prince Rupert into the first week or so of October. Up to and including yesterday landings at Prince Rupert had reached a total of 11,471,850 pounds as compared with 9,218,100 pounds at a corresponding date last year. The Canadian total for 1937 is now 6,104,350 pounds in comparison with 5,058,100 pounds and the American total 5,367,500 pounds as against 4,160,000 pounds. During the past week landings amounted to 306,000 pounds including 106,000 pounds from Canadian vessels and 200,000 pounds from American. Prices during the week were at the highest level of the year. The top bid of the week for American fish was 13.6c and 8c which the Flint was paid for 9000 pounds and the low 9c and 7c which the Majestic received for 35,000 pounds. For Canadian fish the high price of the week was 12.8c and 7c paid the Covenant for 11,000 pounds and the low 9.1c and 7c received by the Atli for 6000 pounds.

Having accompanied an experimental carload shipment of frozen salmon in the new type of overhead ice bunker refrigerator car, O. C. Young, mechanical engineer of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, is due to arrive in London, England, tomorrow or Monday aboard the steamer Beaverhill. Following the delivery of the fish, which was a shipment from the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. here, Mr. Young will visit the Low Temperature Research Station at Cambridge, England, and the Torry Research Station at Aberdeen, Scotland, both institutions of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research of the British government. He expects to be away a couple of months.

The Alaska Evangelistic Society's mission boat Lady Ruth, after having been here since Wednesday morning, left this morning in continuation of her voyage from Juneau, where she has been based during the past season, to Seattle where she will be tied up for the winter. Stops will be made at various points on the way down the coast including Bella Bella which it is expected to reach by Monday.
