WINDSORS SAIL TOMORROW PARIS-The Duke and Duchess of Windsor today disregarded a protest of the Baltimore Federation of Labor, which was endorsed by William Green, president of the A.F. of L., against "slumming parties professing to help and study labor," and proceeded with plans to sail tomorrow for their United States tour. A representative of the Duke said that no change in arrangements had been made or contemplated. The Baltimore Labor Federation on Wednseday condemned the Duke for planning a tour of the United States with Charles E. Bedaux as guide, terming Bedaux, an industrial engineer, as an arch-enemy of Labor. The resolution contained the "slumming party reference," suggested Nazi sympathies of the Duke and observed that the Duchess had never before evinced any interest in the welfare of the laboring classes.
