AN EXPRESSION OF CONFIDENCE IN RUPERT

The sale of section two property evoked the best expression of confidence in the future of Prince Rupert that has yet been shown. Sentiment in the mouths of the multitude is often a cheap thing, but there is always sincerity in the act of the real estate purchaser who plunks down his dollars and lets them speak his mind for him.

The satisfactory prices received and the continued stiffening of the market during the sale showed that the market was not keyed up by momentary excitement or passing enthusiasm. They also afford an excellent basis of comparison of the values of properties in the inner sections—a comparison that cannot fail to increase the confidence of investors in inside property and result in an enhancement of values.

It is understood that the prices received exceeded by a considerable amount those expected by the vendors. Towards this the gentleman selected as auctioneer undoubtedly contributed in good part by the confidence he inspired and the unquestioned satisfaction he gave the audience from day to day. It would be a graceful and popular act for the railway company to recognise his exceptional service by a presentation such as that suggested at the close of Saturday's sale.

IN TABLOID DOSES

New machinery for the electric light plant has been ordered, but no transformers, and further delays will take place after January when the machinery is hoped to be installed. The Council should consider at once the advisability of purchasing transformers and arranging to instal a day load for power users at the earliest date.

Everything in the Land Registry strong room was in perfect condition and undamaged by the fire when the vault was opened this morning by Alex Yule in the presence of Provincial Police Chief Owen and members of the office staff. Mr. Burrit, the registrar, was able to send a wire at once to Attorney-General Bowser reporting the safety of the majority of the important books, papers and records. A temporary outside door protecting the inner door is now being erected.
