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Ruthless War Goes On Furiously

MOVING TO OPPOSITION

Former Attorney General of Alberta Deserts Social Credit In Legislative Chamber

EDMONTON, Sept. 24: (CP) — Former Attorney General John Huggill yesterday requested his seat in the Alberta Legislature, opening today, removed from the Social Credit government side to that of the Opposition. Huggill, who describes the present administration as the "most incompetent and futile ever known in the history of Canada, intimates that he will call for Premier Aberhart's resignation from the floor of the House. He claims that Aberhart, not being a member of the legal profession, is not qualified to act as attorney general.

The special session of the Legislature opened today with the reading of the speech from the Throne which the government plans to have disposed of by this afternoon or evening. Some ten bills of Social Credit legislation are to be put through and the session is not expected to last more than three or four days.

No Interference

Dispatches from Ottawa indicate that the Dominion government does not intend to interfere with the voters-in-council passed by the Aberhart government this week designed to prevent the testing of Social Credit legislation in the courts. The Department of Justice at Ottawa intimated yesterday that any person desirous of doing so may refer any of the acts to the courts for reference as to their validity. Half a dozen oil companies in the Turner Valley have transferred their bank accounts from Calgary to Vancouver, issuing their checks from the coast city. This action has been taken against the possibility of enforcement of Social Credit government legislation involving Alberta bank branches.

Wilkins Was Forced Down

Last Way in Mist Yesterday And Landed on Lake Northeast Of Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Sept. 24: — On their way back to New York after their unsuccessful search flights in Arctic regions for the missing Soviet transpolar fliers, Sir Hubert Wilkins and his pilot Herbert Hollick-Kenyon, missed Lac du Bonnet in the misty weather yesterday and, instead, landed on a lake fifty miles northeast of Winnipeg. They had taken off yesterday from Fort Chippewyan in Northern Alberta.

Premier Mussolini Is Visiting Germany

Official Welcome Will Take Place At Munich Tomorrow With Big Show in Berlin On Monday

BERLIN, Sept. 24: — Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy will be formally welcomed to Germany at Munich tomorrow. On Monday the principal show in connection with the visit of Il Duce will take place in Berlin.

Three Women Instantly Killed And Fourth May Die As Result Of West Vancouver Auto Smash

VANCOUVER, September 24: (CP)—Three women were instantly killed, a fourth was critically injured—probably fatally—and a fifth less seriously hurt in an automobile accident on the steep hill of Highland Drive in Capilano Estates of the British Pacific Properties on Hollyburn Ridge at West Vancouver late yesterday afternoon. The sightseeing automobile of the five women went out of control, bolted down the steep grade and turned over four times. The dead are Mrs. Samuel Thornbury of Perth, Ontario; her sister, Mrs. J. W. Hogg, 8620 French Street, Vancouver, and Mrs. Robert Be-Beth of Los Angeles, a cousin. Miss Lillian Graham of Los Angeles, Mrs. McBeth's sister, who was driving the car, was probably fatally injured.

MAY ACT IN SPAIN

JAPS ARE ACCUSED

Held Responsible by Soviet For Inciting Acts of Sabotage On Eastern Siberian Railroad

MOSCOW, Sept. 24: — The Soviet government yesterday officially charged Japan with inciting sabotage on the Eastern Siberian Railway. Two hundred and twelve persons have been executed since last May for acts of sabotage on the railway, it is announced.

PRESIDENT IS ON WAY

Receiving Warm Welcome All Along Route To Speak At Cheyenne

CLINTON, Iowa, Sept. 24: — President Franklin D. Roosevelt stopped briefly here yesterday in the course of his journey to the West Coast and, with Mrs. Roosevelt, appeared on the rear-end platform of his special train to receive a great reception. Warm welcomes were extended at all points in the Middle West where the chief executive paused. The President will make his first speech at Cheyenne, Wyoming.

BONUS IS APPROVED

The National Maritime Union, affiliate of the Committee on Industrial Organization, had demanded a \$250 bonus.

ARRESTS IN FUR STEAL

Two Men Taken in Northern British Columbia by Provincial Police Officers

VICTORIA, Sept. 24: — According to word received at provincial police headquarters here, arrest has been made in Northern British Columbia by Sergeant E. Gaffney and Corp. Cook of Prince George and other officers; of two men as a result of a long search for the participants in a \$34,000 fur robbery from the Hudson Bay Co.'s post at Fort Nelson in August 1935. The search took on new life recently following the discovery of a cache containing a large quantity of the stolen furs.

Young Mussolini Visits America

To Study Moving Picture Methods — Precautions Taken Against Anti-Fascist Demonstrations

NEW YORK, September 24: — Vittorio Mussolini, second son of Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy, arrived in New York yesterday. He was taken from the Free Rex at immigration and whisked away under police guard to seclusion. Anti-Fascist demonstrations were feared should he have appeared in public. Young Mussolini is in America to learn moving picture methods of this country. Hal Roach, well-known Hollywood producer, will work with him.

"IRON LUNG" IS DONATED

Public-spirited Vancouver Citizen Purchases Equipment For Vancouver Hospital

VANCOUVER, Sept. 24: — A public-spirited citizen, whose identity is not revealed for publication, has donated an "iron lung" to the Vancouver General Hospital for use in the event of an outbreak of infantile paralysis here. This special type of respirator, which costs \$900, has been ordered from Boston and is expected to arrive in about ten days. BIG NAVY AND ARMY

American Legion Urges Great Increase in Uncle Sam's Forces — Next Convention in Los Angeles

NEW YORK, Sept. 24: — After passing resolutions urging the United States to equip itself with the largest navy in the world and to greatly increase its regular army, the nineteenth convention of the American Legion concluded here yesterday. Stanley Doherty of Boston was elected national commander while Mrs. Norton Douglas of Seattle was chosen president of the Women's Auxiliary. Mrs. Douglas is the wife of a King County judge. Los Angeles was chosen as the 1938 convention city.

Robbed Miners Who Sheltered Him; Gets Jail

PRINCE GEORGE, Sept. 24: — A man who stole \$100 of gold from four placer miners down the Fraser River about forty miles below here after he had been given a meal and bed was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment yesterday.

Winnipeg Gets Fall Of Snow

WINNIPEG, Sept. 24: — Half an inch of wet snow fell around Winnipeg yesterday. There was rain and light snow in Saskatchewan with generally cool weather continuing on the prairies.

SENATOR CHARGED

Terms of Information Against Hance J. Logan in Connection With Reparations Claim

OTTAWA, Sept. 24: (CP) — Senator Hance J. Logan of Parrsboro, Nova Scotia, arrested formally by the police yesterday on a warrant based on information by George Beament, associated counsel for Captain Freeman Hatfield who earlier in the day was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment for defrauding the reparations commission in the long-standing case of the schooner Gypsum Queen, is alleged in the information to have "unlawfully by false pretences procured to be delivered by the Bank of Montreal to him the sum of \$71,276.72, the property of His Majesty the King in the right of the Dominion of Canada, with intent to defraud." Senator Logan acted as counsel for Hatfield in his application for reparations for the loss of his schooner in 1915.

SAFETY IS QUESTIONED

Doubt Cast Upon Whether or Not Endeavour I Has Been Located in Atlantic

LONDON, Sept. 24: (CP) — Doubt was cast here last night upon the authenticity of a report that the missing British sailing sloop Endeavour I had been located in the Atlantic Ocean several hundred miles southwest of the Azores. The captain of the British tanker Amastra, which was said to have reported sighting the Endeavour I yesterday, wireless last night denying any such report. He had neither seen or heard of the missing yacht.

STUDY BY NEWSPAPER

Plans Being Considered by Toronto Authorities in View Of Infantile Paralysis Epidemic

TORONTO, Sept. 24: — With schools of the city remaining closed on account of the infantile paralysis epidemic, the Toronto Board of Education is considering a plan to use the news papers, and possibly the radio, in conducting classes for school children in their homes. Such a plan is already in operation in Chicago. There is no definite sign of an end of the epidemic as yet. From Transcona, Manitoba, near Winnipeg, came word yesterday of five new cases.

Victoria Police Seeking All Clues

Assistance of Public in Finding Murderer of Elderly Woman Invited

VICTORIA, Sept. 24: — The police are asking Victoria citizens for all possible assistance in apprehending the slayer of elderly Mrs. H. Smith who was brutally assaulted and murdered in a vacant lot on Tuesday. Any person having any possible clues have been invited to report them to the authorities at once.

NO MERCY IS SHOWN

Japanese Continue Air Raids of Chinese Cities With Thousands of Civilians Being Slaughtered

SHANGHAI, Sept. 24: — Dealing out ruthless death, injury and destruction, Japanese aircraft continued their bombing raids over a wide area in China yesterday. It was the most savage air attack in the history of modern warfare. Three thousand persons are believed to have been killed in Canton, whole sections of which city were reduced to ruins. After a respite of one day owing to heavy rains in the Yangtze Valley, the Nationalist capital city of Nanking was again bombed with an estimated one thousand killed. It is now computed that some 300,000 persons have fled for safety from Nanking to the relative safety of the country.

Hankow Attacked

Great Britain Considering Drastic Action to Stop Conflict
Nine Japanese planes today bombed Hankow port, killing close to two hundred persons and wounding four hundred. The raiders, apparently trying to destroy an army arsenal, dropped bombs on crowded city districts and two in the river near the British gunboat Aphia. The Japanese announced tonight the Paotingfu, Chinese stronghold eighty miles southwest of Peiping, was captured and its Chinese garrison annihilated. WOULD END WAR
LONDON, Sept. 24: (CP) — Great Britain, it was reported last night, was considering taking drastic action to put an end to the Sino-Japanese war. Possibility of invoking the terms of the Washington nine-power treaty guaranteeing the integrity of Chinese territory is mentioned. Special police guards had to be called out last night to protect the Japanese embassy in London after angry crowds had gathered to protest against the warfare in China shouting: "Withdraw your bombers. Take the Japanese murderers out of China."

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
