Swept Back Into Office FROM NORTH By Substantial Margin

Ed Peterson and Barney Turbitt of Electors Renew Their Confidence in Fiery Liberal Chieftain in No Unmistakeable Terms-Wins 63 Seats Out of Ninety

> TORONTO, Oct. 7: (CP)-Premier Mitchell Hepburn's Liberal government was returned to office in yeserday's general provincial election with more than twohirds of the seats in the Legislature of ninety, the standing of parties being little changed from that existing at lissolution. Little more than an hour and a half after he polls closed, the return of the

government by a preponderant majority was conceded. An early sumnary showed 29 Liberals, two LibMORE EGGS ral Progressives and four Conservatives elected.
