Miss Olive Van Cooten, who has been on a vacation trip to Vancouver, returned to the city from the south on the Catala last night.



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
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British Columbia has produced minerals of an aggregate value of \$1,515,728,149.00.

The gross value of the industry for the first six months of 1937 is estimated to be \$36,383,540.00. This is an increase of 53.4% over the value for the corresponding period in 1936.

Indications are that this year's production will exceed that of any previous year in value, which is a splendid commentary upon the stability of the mining industry in this province. New properties are being brought into production, and with the reopening of old properties, mill capacity will be considerably increased over last year.
