## BUFFALO MEAT HERE

Annual Kill Starts at Wainwright, Alberta; Burns Awarded Contract

Burns & Co. Limited, the pioneer packers of the Canadian west, again have been awarded the contract covering the annual kill of buffalo at the Wainwright National Park where each year for the past several years similar operations have been undertaken by authority of the Federal government. The object of the kill is to keep the last great surviving roamers of the prairie under proper control.

It is estimated that two thousand head of buffalo will be killed under government supervision at the government slaughter house specially located for the purpose at Wainwright, Alberta.

The choice, young, tender buffalo meat will be marketed in all parts of Canada by Burns & Co. Limited through high class butcher shops and, as well, will be served as a pre-Christmas treat in the better hotels, restaurants and clubs. The first consignment will reach Prince Rupert Wednesday, December 22nd, and the local management of Burns & Co. Ltd. advising placing your orders early. Your own butcher will carry supplies.
