

## HEALTH INSURANCE

COLLECTIONS START

MARCH 1, 1937 ALL EMPLOYEES MUST REGISTER

In order to secure the benefits of Health Insurance every employee who earns \$1800, or less, a year must register on forms obtainable from his employer.

As deductions from salaries or wages of all employees not exempt under the Act are compulsory, those who neglect to register are denying themselves the benefits while paying

Benefits under the Act include full medical, surgical and hospital care for registered employees, their wives and dependent children. Maternity treatment is also provided. The insured may choose his own doctor and is entitled to X-ray and laboratory services where necessary, as well as half the cost of necessary medicines and drugs.

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
