What It May Mean

If the Peace River western outlet should be built to Hazelton or to some other suitable point on the Canadian National Railway in that neighborhood, it is difficult for us to realize what this would mean to Prince Rupert.

The committee that is working with the Peace River committee to interest Parliament in this matter has called a public meeting for Monday night and it is asking all citizens, men or women, who can do so to attend that meeting for a brief period. It is not much for them to do it may mean a great deal.

The meeting will open sharp at 8 o'clock and should not last more than half an hour. A resolution will be presented asking the Dominion Government to consider the advisability of commencing work at once on a railway connecting the Peace River with Hazelton or some other suitable point with a view to shipping grain from there to Prince Rupert. If this is well supported at a mass meeting here it will at least show that we are alive to the situation and in earnest in the desire to have the railway built.

It is felt by the committee that this is the right time to recommence the effort to have the Peace outlet built to connect with this port and the meeting is part of the effort that is to be put forth with a view to bringing it to their attention. If everybody leaves it to others nobody will be at the meeting. Half an hour is not much time to give to this cause, a cause which might be very helpful to the whole community.

Something Grim
