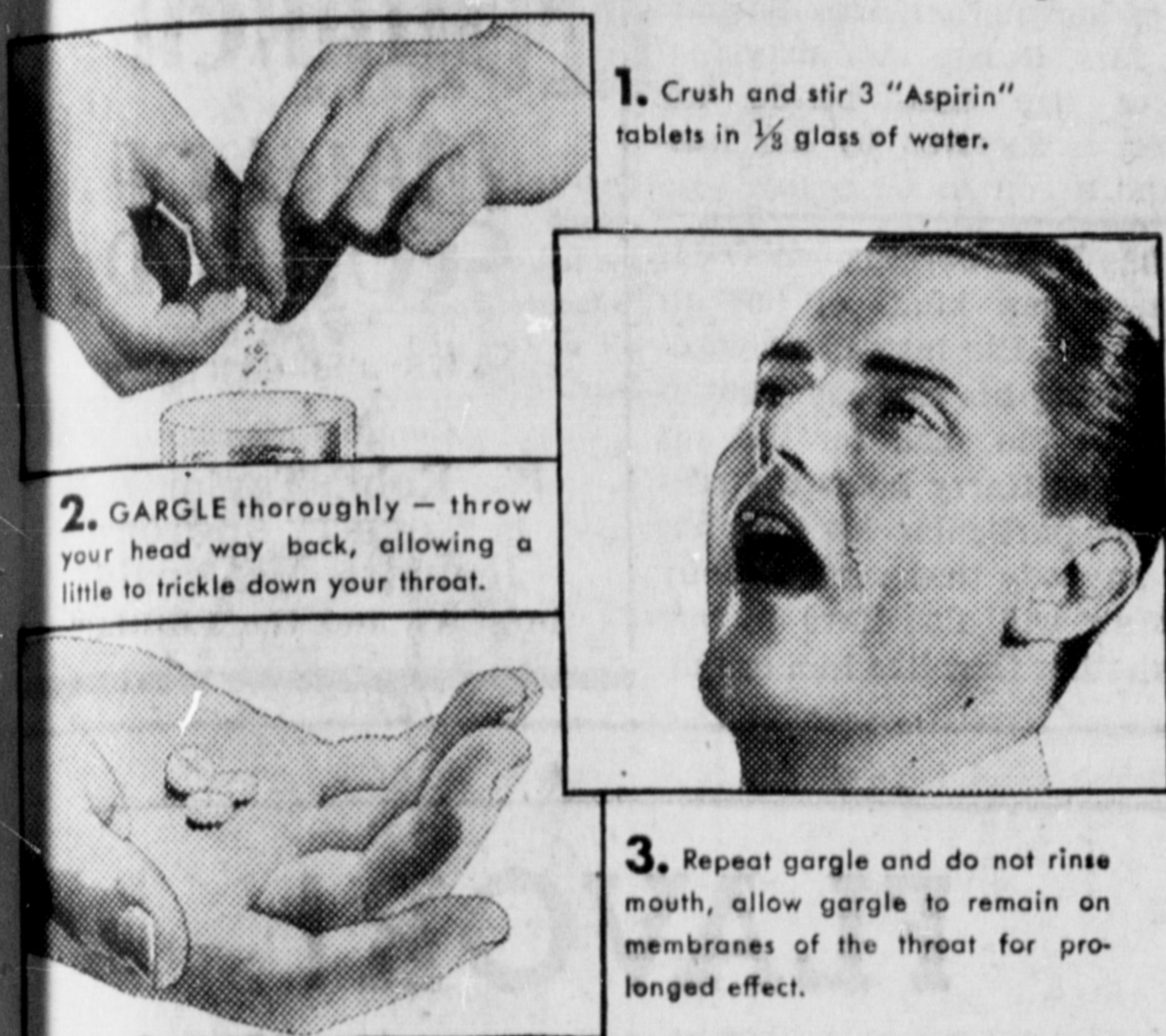

LOCAL NEWS NOTES

Peace River Railway meeting, city hall, Monday at 8.

Correspondence at last night's meeting of the hospital board included a message of seasonal greetings from E. W. Neel, president of the British Columbia Hospitals' Association. Pleasure was expressed at hearing from Mr. Neel in this way.

B. Irvine of Vancouver, radio inspector from Vancouver, is here on official duties, having arrived on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon from Ocean Falls. He is to check up on local reception conditions.

Erik Frey, Seattle baritone, who has been on a concert tour of the north, arrived from Ketchikan on the Princess Norah Thursday afternoon, gave a recital here last night and sailed this morning on the Princess Adelaide for the south.

The monthly report of Fire Chief J. R. Morrison, received at last night's meeting of the hospital board, stated that the usual inspections had been made at the hospital and nurses' home and that everything had been found to be in good order.

After receiving and perusing the balance sheet for the year 1936 from the auditor, George L. Rorie, the hospital board last night recommended the document for the adoption of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association at the annual meeting, date of which was set for January 26.

The regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Prince Rupert General Hospital was held last night. The session lasted for almost three hours, a good deal longer than usual, there being considerable business of an extraordinary nature, including planning of a new hospital financial campaign and preparations for the annual general meeting later in the month. Those present were W. M. Brown, chairman; G. P. Tinker, Frank Dibb, S. D. Macdonald, G. V. Wilkinson, F. S. Walton and City Commissioner W. J. Alder, directors; H. W. Birch, managing secretary, and Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent.

Finally, it was decided that the president should appoint a committee to draft a plan for the new hospital campaign and send it to various organizations which would be asked to name delegates to a meeting prior to the annual meeting of the hospital association. A motion to this effect was put forward by Frank Dibb and seconded by Fred Walton. The committee was later named by the president in the persons of Frank Dibb, City Commissioner W. J. Alder and G. P. Tinker.

The importance of a full and representative attendance at the annual meeting was stressed by the city commissioner and others.

There was correspondence from Premier T. D. Pattullo and A. Dixon, chief engineer of the provincial public works department, in regard to the new hospital project.

Tonight's train, due from the east at 10:20, was reported this morning to be on time.

During last night's regular meeting of the hospital board discussion arose on the question as to whether certain affairs pertaining to the hospital, more particularly on this occasion as to finances, should receive press publicity. W. M. Brown, chairman of the board, expressed the belief that this was a matter which might receive early attention from the new board for this year with a view to deciding on a line of policy. Members of the board expressed appreciation of co-operation that had always been extended by the press to the hospital.

A letter from the Trail hospital, received at last night's meeting of the local hospital board, asked for information in regard to charges for pneumo-thorax and x-ray treatment given at the hospital, under the new tuberculosis service of the provincial government. The Trail board will be informed that a charge of \$1 is made for x-ray examinations while the pneumo-thorax treatment is administered by the local tuberculosis doctor outside of the hospital. Prince Rupert, Trail and Kelowna are the three points in the province at which tuberculosis service centres have been set up.

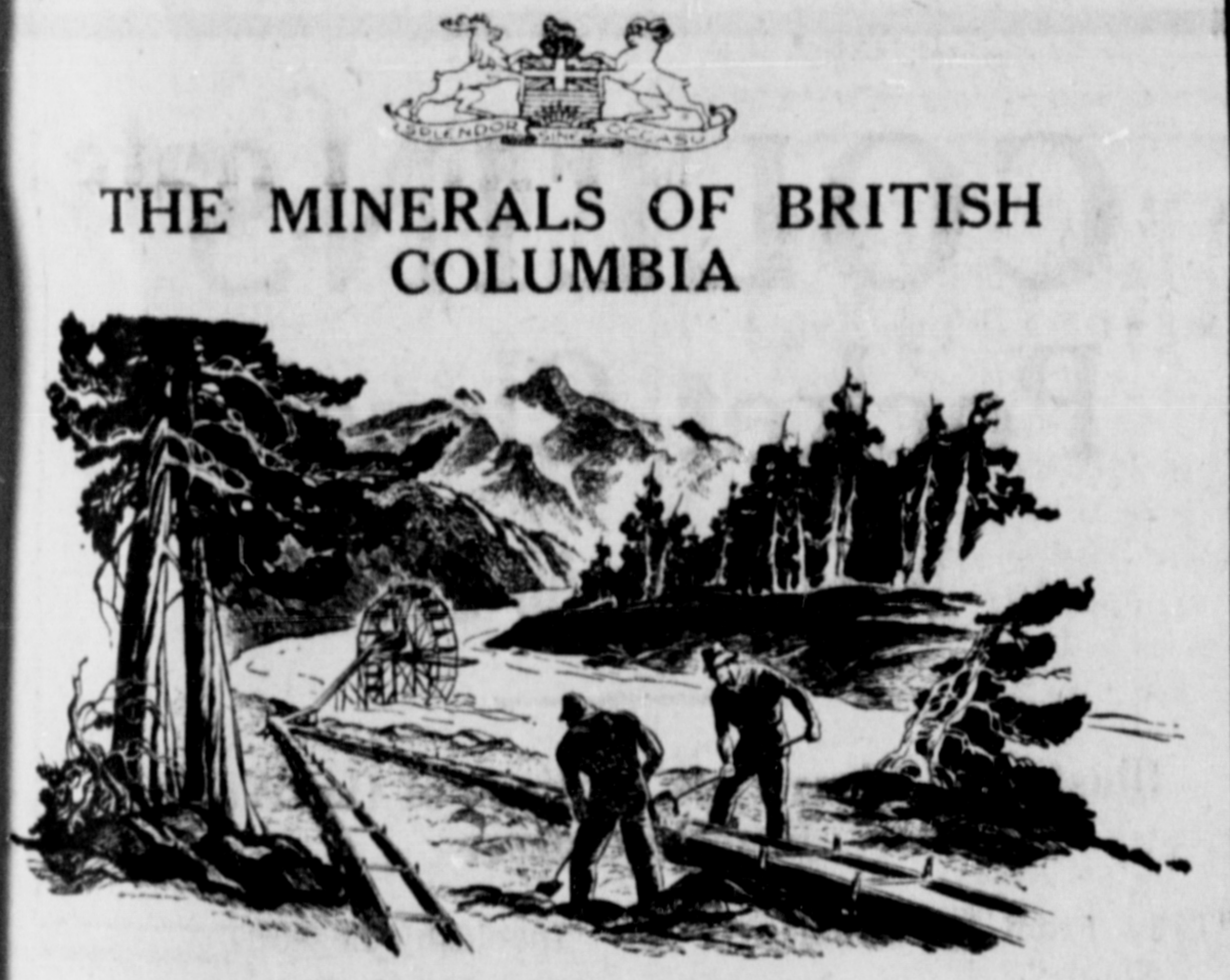
