RELIEF ON PRAIRIES

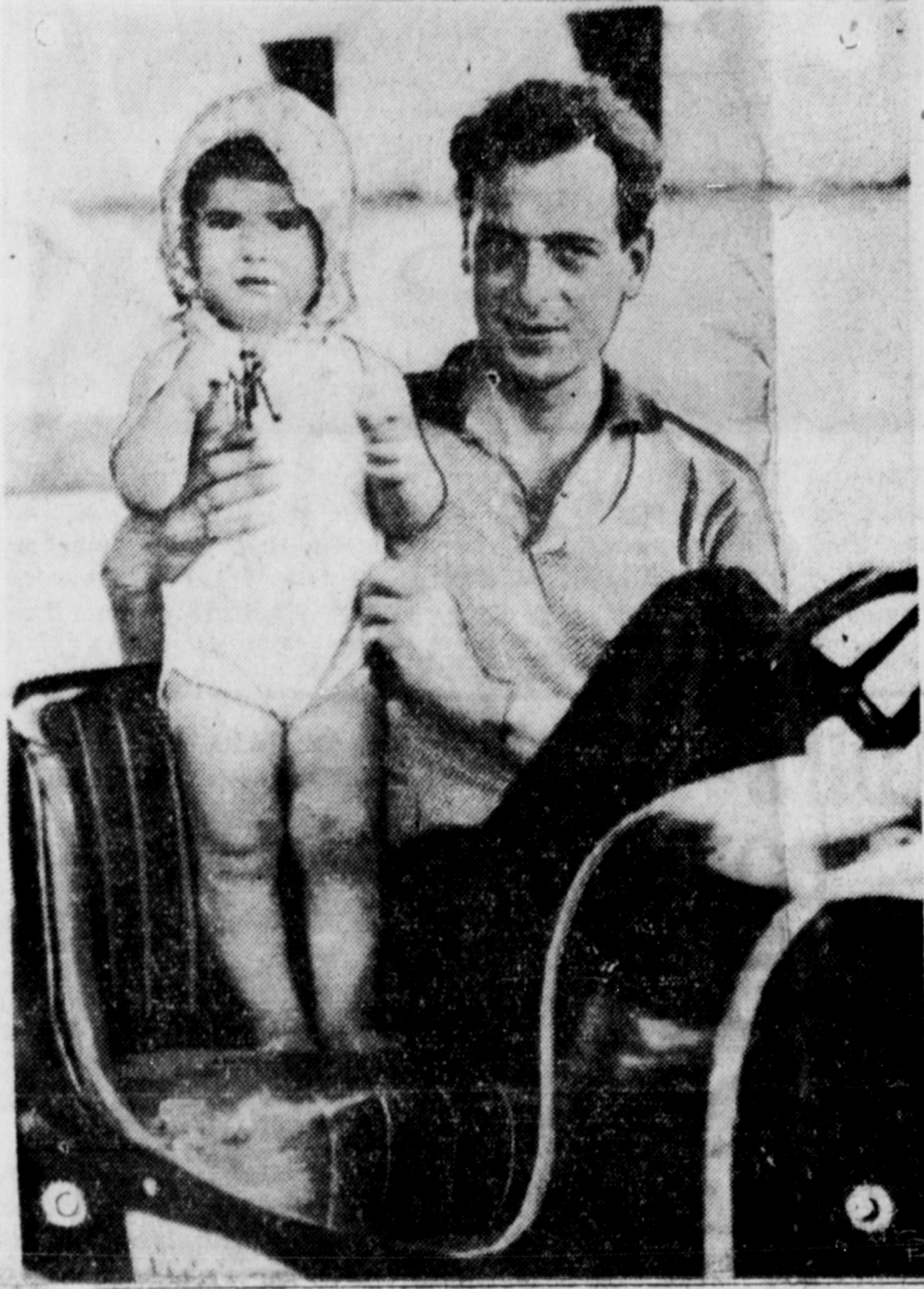
Single Men in West Again to be Taken Care of on Farms, It is Announced

OUTPUT OF LOGS BIG

Moresby Island Camps Produce Over 100,000,000 Feet for New Record Since War

Logging camps of Moresby Island, second of the Queen Charlotte group, will record an output of over 100,000,000 feet for this season, the largest since the war, according to estimates given by the operators themselves.

About the end of this month, the camps will be starting the usual winter curtailment of operations although none of the camps will be completely closed down.
The three principal operators on the Islands are A. P. Allison at Cumsheva Inlet, T. A. Kelley at Murchison Island and J. R. Morgan at Thurston Harbor.

Prince Rupert "Most Beautiful Place" On West Coast—So Declare John Jacob Astor and His Party

"Although our stay in your city was short," writes Mr. Astor, "we enjoyed seeing the city and all agreed it was the most beautiful place we had seen anywhere on the West Coast."
Mr. Alder called upon Mr. Astor while he was here and also had flowers sent to Mrs. Astor.

NEW PLANE DELIVERED

First of Machines For Trans-Canada Service Reaches Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Oct. 6:—The first delivery of the fleet of new planes for the Trans-Canada Air Lines was received in Vancouver yesterday afternoon. Before the end of the month it is expected that two additional planes will arrive here for the trans-Canada service to be followed during the next few months by four larger planes.

The plane received yesterday is a Lockheed Model 10-A and will carry ten passengers as well as a pilot and co-pilot. It will be put into immediate use for the training of pilots in instrument flying. Pilot Billy Wells and members of Trans-Canada's staff here were on hand to meet the ship which was flown by factory representatives from Glendale, California. It will be completely checked and put through its paces tomorrow before acceptance by the company.

The Lockheed 10-A's are powered with two Pratt and Whitney Junior Wasp engines which give them a maximum speed of 205 miles per hour, with a cruising speed of 183 miles per hour. They have fuel capacity of 207 gallons with a cruising range of 720 miles. Their wing span is 55 feet, with an overall length of 33 feet 7 inches. They weigh 10,500 pounds with full load.

The other two planes to be delivered before the end of the month will be identical to the one received today while the four other planes of the fleet of seven will be 14-place Lockheeds. They will be the largest and speediest type ever used in regular scheduled air line service in Canada. They, as well as the 10-passenger Lockheeds, have twin engines, two-way radio communication apparatus and all of the latest devices for ensuring the comfort of the passengers and safety in flying.

The Lockheed 14-place airliners are powered by two Pratt and Whitney Hornet engines which will carry the big machines through the air at a maximum speed of 247 miles per hour when flying at a height of 6700 feet, with a cruising speed varying from 200 to 220 miles per hour according to the height at which they are flown. They have a fuel capacity of 650 gallons and a cruising range up to 2,125 miles. They weigh, fully loaded, 17,000 pounds. They have a wing span of 65 feet 6 inches, with a wing area of 551 square feet, and an overall length of 44 feet, 4 inches.

Rebels Still Moving Ahead

Advancing Steadily Towards Gijon—Several Villages Captured on Way

HENDAYE, October 6—Insurgent forces are reported to be making steady progress toward Gijon, last loyalist stronghold on the northern coast of Spain. Several villages have been captured in the course of the rebel advance.

Expectation is That Vice-Roy Will Also Decline to Sign Contentious Legislation—Another Lively Constitutional Issue Appears in Prospect

EDMONTON, Oct. 6: (CP)—Lieutenant Governor J. C. Bowen yesterday prorogued the Alberta Legislature after assenting to eight bills and reserving three for the pleasure of the Governor General. Assent was reserved on the "Act to Ensure Publication of Accurate News and Information," the "Act Respecting Taxation of Banks" and the "Act to Amend and Consolidate the Credit of Alberta Regulation Act," which was substituted for the bill designed to give the government control of banks in the province and which had been previously disallowed.

The three highly contentious bills which the Lieutenant Governor designed to assent to will be referred to the Governor General who, it is expected in constitutional quarters, will decline to assent to them. Another lively constitutional issue appears to be in prospect.

LEAGUE GIVES JAPAN WARNING

GENEVA, Oct. 6: (CP)—The Assembly of the League of Nations today warned Japan of the possibility of international action unless she agrees to a peaceful nine-power settlement of the China conflict.

ANOTHER ARRESTED

Advisor of Alberta Social Credit Government Charged with Criminal Libel

EDMONTON, Oct. 6: (CP)—George F. Powell, advisor to the Social Credit government of Alberta, was arrested last night on charges of criminal libel and later released on bail of \$20,000, half on his own recognizance and \$5000 each posted by S. A. Berg, Social Credit member for Alexandra and A. E. Fee, member for Sedgewick.

Powell, sent as a Social Credit expert to Alberta by Major Douglas, is also charged with counselling murder, seditious libel and defamatory libel knowing the same to be false. The charges are laid in connection with the publication of an allegedly libellous leaflet.

Earlier in the day G. F. McLaughlin, manager of the Social Credit League of Alberta, was questioned by the police but was not arrested.
Joseph Unwin, government whip in the legislature, arrested yesterday on charges of criminal and defamatory libel as well as counselling murder, has been remanded until October 14.

JAPANESE FALL BACK

Retreat Before Furious Chinese Counter-Attack—Heavy Casualties on Both Sides

SHANGHAI, Oct. 6—Japanese forces were driven back half a mile on a five-mile front in the Chapei district yesterday as the Chinese staged a furious counter-attack. There were heavy casualties on both sides.
The Chinese counter-attack came after a steady four-day siege in which aircraft were used extensively in bombing.

WINTER IN SIGHT NOW

Snow Makes Appearance Well Down on Mountains Around Smithers

SMITHERS, Oct. 6:—Old Man Winter shoved his head into the foreground at Smithers Friday. A two day spell of heavy rain had been in progress when the mountains were obscured with low lying clouds and fog. When the weather cleared Friday morning and the mountains stood out in their usual snow it was noticed that not only were the mountain tops covered with snow but the snow was a long way down the slopes and into the low timber. In fact many of the low hills of the Bulkley Valley received some of the snow fall. It is not expected that the snow will arrive on the floor of the valley for some weeks yet although there might be light falls that will disappear soon after falling.
