ROAD BUILDING ACTIVITY

Evidenty, judging by the dispatch published in this paper yesterday, there is going to be a good road building program this year. The money to pay for this will be drawn from various funds. In the first place there is the regular maintenance vote for the district which will be expended in various parts of the constituency. Then there is the share of the three million dollars borrowd in the east recently by Premier Pattullo which, it is presumed, will be expended on the main highways and there is the fund of which the federal governmnt pays half which is for main highways only and only on such particular highway schemes as are approved by the federal government. Outside of these there is a fund provided by the federal and provincial govrnments for mining roads only, such as the road north from Vanderhoof into the mining country as far as Finlay Forks. Last year there was a grant from this fund for the Big Missouri road at Stewart and the Dolly Varden road at Alice Arm. The details of these expenditures have not yet been announced. What is sure is that there will be good progress made on main highways and other roads including mining roads and that this will absorb a good deal of the unemployed at present drawing relief.


