The Outstanding Problem

Morris W. Wilson, president and managing director of the Royal Bank of Canada, is something or a radical among bankers. In his report to the shareholders of the bank he used the following words:

"It is the fashion in certain quarters to say that the system of capitalism—or as I prefer to term it, individualism—has failed. In the past it had adapted itself to changes in economic conditions and social concepts and there is no reason to think such adaptations will not continue to be made. In fact they must be made if the system is to survive. With Communism, Fascism and Nazism in competition, individualism will survive only if the benefits which it provides to the community continue to be greater than those conferred upon people living under other organizations of society."

There are then two courses to pursue if Mr. Wilson is right. One is to keep ahead of every other system in carrying on the affairs of the country so that every person in the country will receive the benefits and the other is to keep the people of the country educated on the advantages of the system under which we live as compared with other systems. The Communists and Fascists are constantly urging the benefits of their systems. We also must show the benefits of our own system.

During depression days we a number of times drew attention to a condition in this country which needs revision. We had on one side plenty of food, plenty of clothes, plenty of fuel, more of each than the nation could use and yet we had at the same time men, women and children hungry, poorly clad and shivering in the cold. There was something wrong with the system of distribution. Under the system of relief this was partially rectified but not in a manner satisfactory to either the recipients of relief or the general public. This is a condition which requires the ability and influence of such men as Mr. Wilson to help set right. The solution of the problem should not all be left to the politicians nor should it be left to the radical agitators. We shall never have a safe and sound body politic until these glaring injustices are rectified.

We are very glad to see a man of Mr. Wilson's standing pointing out to the people of the country what is their duty in matters of this kind. We have all been proud of our banking system when we have seen the system in a neighboring country go to smash at a critical time. We have been given a sense of security, even when we may have been refused a loan which we thought we should have received. Bankers should be among the leaders in the various communities throughout the country and the high officials are bound to contribute to the solution of important problems. Unemployment is a cancer strangling our system and the best surgeons should bend their energies toward removing it.

BIG SCORE IN HOCKEY

Maple Leafs Defeat Maroons 7 To 4—Americans Blank Canadiens

TORONTO, Feb. 1: (CP)—The Toronto Maple Leafs made a field day of it in defeating the Montreal Maroons by a score of seven to four in Saturday night's National Hockey League game at the Maple Leaf Gardens. It was a wide-open game with the Maple Leafs amassing a lead of six goals before the Maroons started to score in the third and final period. The kid forward line of Apps, Drillon and Harvey Jackson gave a dazzling display with Drillon and Harvey Jackson each doing the hat trick by getting three goals while Art Jackson accounted for the seventh. The Leafs gathered two counters in the first period, both by Jackson, two in the second period, one by Drillon and the other by Art Jackson, and three in the third, two by Drillon and one by Harvey Jackson. The Maroons did all their scoring in the third period. Robinson, Blinco, Shannon and Evans each collecting one.

Harvey Jackson's opening goal came after three minutes 27 seconds of play on a pass from Hap Day. Sylvanus Apps' rink-wide pass enabled the Busher to make the second counter just before the end of the first period.

Soon after the start of the second period Drillon made Toronto's third with Harvey Jackson and Apps getting credit for the assist. Art Jackson made the fourth in seven minutes on assists by Nick Metz and Red Horner.

The third period had hardly commenced when Drillon put the Leafs five up on a pass from Apps. Before the shouting had died down, Drillon went right into the goal unassisted for the sixth. Four minutes after the start of the period, the Maroons, who had been completely dominated by the Maple Leafs so far, put on the power and Earl Robinson scored on Russ Blinco's assist. A minute later Blinco went right in for the Maroons' second. With less than two minutes to go, Harvey Jackson made the seventh for the Leafs on a pass from Drillon. Shannon then faked a pass and scored unassisted to give the Maroons their third. Within the last fifty seconds, Stew Evans scored unassisted.

There were only three penalties, Hamilton of the Leafs going off in the first period for boarding while Davidson of the Maple Leafs and Gus Marker of the Maroons went to the penalty box in the second for high stick-handling during a melee.

Playing at Montreal New York Americans beat the Canadiens four to nil, making one goal in the first period and three near the end of the third. The Canadiens got revenge last night.
