Says Russia Has Been Active for Loyalists-Japan Recognizes Franco

LONDON, Nov. 18: (CP)-Russia's acceptance of a compromise in connection with non-intervention in the Spanish civil war has brought a charge from Italy that the Soviet had been landing large amounts of fighting supplies and had sent heavy reinforcements to assist the loyalists in prosecuting the war in Spain.

In Tokyo it is anounced that the Japanese government will formally Premier Border. .011/4. recognize General Francisco Franco's insurgent regime in Spain on November 25, the same day on which Italy and Germany will recognize Manchuokuo, the Japanese puppet state in China.

In Barcellona the president of loyalist Spain said today that evacuation of foreign volunteers would adversely affect his side.
