Sir John Simon Asks Great Britain For Increase on Stabilization Fund

LONDON, June 25: (CP)—Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, yesterday asked the House of Commons to increase the exchange equalization fund by £200,000,000 to support Great Britain's monetary agreement with the United States and France. He said that this jump would bring the fund to £550,000,-000 and was made necessary by the unsettled international mo-

netary situation. "In addition to the recent release of hoarded gold," Sir John said, "there has been much financial disturbance abroad and a general tendency for capital funds to move to London."
