EASTERN TROUBLES

Down in the central provinces of Ontario and Quebec there is much stir afoot. In Ontario, Premier Hepburn, puffed up by a recent general election victory, has made a contract with the Beauharnois Light, Heat and Power Company to purchase power which, it is said, is not at present needed. Evidently the Premier expected to be able to force the hands of the federal government to allow a good deal of this power to be resold in the United States. The necessary authority has been refused. Mr. Hepburn is threatening to hold up the program of the federal government which includes a change in the British North America Act, to allow them to carry out their unemployment insurance and other policies.

Premier Duplessis seems to have joined forces with Mr. Hepburn and the political struggle is still going on. At this distance it is not easy to see what will be the outcome.

The federal government, it is suggested, is anxious to conclude a treaty with the United States for the building of a deep sea route from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic so that ocean going vessels might go right up to Fort William and Chicago. This project would involve the generation of power which it is claimed the present companies could easily supply.

While the west is not interested particularly in the St. Lawrence Deep Waterways scheme or in the power problems of Ontario and Quebec, it is interested in the change in the British North America Act to allow of the passing of unemployment insurance and other laws. For that reason we are anxious that the political squabbles at Ottawa shall be settled.

THE SMALL TOWN LIFE

In a large city people often do not know their next door neighbors. In a town the size of Prince Rupert people usually know their neighbors and often almost half the people of the city are known to a great many personally. We live more or less of a village life.

This village life has its advantages and disadvantages. While it lends itself to village gossip and petty scandal-mongering it also means that in time of trouble or difficulty people find themselves surrounded by a host of friends. On the whole, the advantages are as great, if not greater, than the disadvantages.

PLAYING OF BASKETBALL

Hoop League of Four or Five Teams Getting Under Way at Kitkatla

KITKATLA, December 29:— Under the auspices of the Excelsior Club, a basketball league, which it is expected will consist of some four or five teams, is being organized in Kitkatla. The organization of the league got under way at a general meeting of the Excelsior Club last week with the president, Matthew Hill, in the chair. It will be the first time that basketball has been played in Kitkatla but all the local athletes are keen for it. Norman Lewis, as chairman, and Ed. Innis, as secretary, are prominent in connection with the basketball organization.

The village hall is having necessary alterations made to fit it for basketball. Play is expected to commence at once.
