

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, Jan. 9: (CP)—Martin ("Farmer") Burns, the dean of American wrestlers, holder of the world's heavyweight wrestling championship from 1895 to 1897, discoverer and tutor of

In 1895, Burns threw the chamion, Tom Jenkins, for the heavyweight title, but held it only two years. Not long after, he discovered Frank Gotch behind a plow in lowa and introduced him into the nat game with such success that Jotch ruled the heavyweight ranks for many years.
