

Estimates Of Dead In Fire

Ruffians Loot Homes as Residents Flee From Conflagration In Philippine Town

MANILA, May 25: (CP)—Newspaper reports vary from "two known dead" to "many believed dead" as a result of an uncontrolled fire which swept through the gold mining town of Paracale. Ruffians were reported to be looting homes as terror-stricken residents fled before the wind-driven flames.

Halibut landings at the port of Seattle last week totalled 843,000 pounds, the volume being the heaviest for any single week so far this year except one in March when 900,000 pounds was landed at the Puget Sound port. Seattle prices for the past week averaged slightly upwards of 8c per pound.

On Saturday nine halibut vessels landed catches totalling 188,000 pounds at Seattle as follows: Brisk, 35,000 pounds, Booth, 8½c and 8c; Kanaga, 39,000 pounds, 8c straight; Hene, 35,000 pounds, Sebastian, 8½c and 8c; Coolidge, 24,000 pounds, Whiz, 8½c and 8c; Reliance, 6,000 pounds, Whiz, 8½c and 7c; Ethel S., 17,500 pounds, 8½c and 7c; Angelus, 16,000, Ripley, 8½c and 7c; Superior, 9,000, San Juan, 8½c and 7c; Don, 6,500 pounds, 8½c and 7c.

Eleven halibut vessels marketing a total of 264,000 pounds made a heavy day's halibut business at Seattle yesterday. Sales were: Liabona, 40,000 pounds, McCallum, 9c and 6½c; Attu, 39,000, San Juan, 9c and 6½c; Lituya, 31,000, Sebastian, 9c and 6½c; Resolute, 30,000, Booth, 9½c and 6c; Addington, 25,000, New England, 8½c and 7½c; Celtic, 39,000, Whiz, 9c and 6½c; Freya, 18,000, Booth, 9c and 7c; Huskie, L., 8,000, San Juan, 9½c and 7c; Madelaine, 10,000, Washington, 10½c and 7c; Merit, 9,000, Washington, 9½c and 7c; Roosevelt, 15,000, San Juan, 8½c and 7c.

To Salmon Trollers

Messrs. Woodworth and Telford, leaders of the C. C. F., advocate votes for Orientals. How long do you suppose it will be after Japs get the vote before they obtain trollers' licences and dominate trolling as they now do gill-netting? You know Japanese contractors supply Jap labor in a block as required.

Will they not also supply Japanese votes in a block where Japanese interests demand it?

You know that Japan is claiming the right to fish in international waters off British Columbia. What will happen here, if the Japanese have the franchise, when we are called upon to vote on the question of allowing Japanese encroachment upon our fishing grounds?

The white races are not allowed the franchise in Japan. Why should we give the Japs the vote here? Japan admits the races will never mix. You must admit them to be right. Are you prepared to give them equal rights with yourselves in your fishing and fraternal organizations? Will you accept them in your boat crews, in your lodges and in your homes? You must do this if, as Mr. Woodworth says, we are to assimilate them.
