INDUSTRIAL REVIVAL

Great Britain's industrial revival is indicated by the increase in steel production in South Wales. Some of the improvement is being shown in the districts which were hard hit during the depression. Welsh coal export has been increasing steadily and shipbuilding continues. Government arms factories have given a fillip to employment in some districts, one of which is at Usk on the River Wye in Monmouthshire. There has been an increase of employment at Tyneside and Hartlepool.

The River Clyde is being straightened at a cost of \$300,000 in order to allow the sister ship of the Queen Mary to pass out. Numbers of ships for foreign customers are being built and a large floating dock for Russia.

Everywhere throughout the country industrial conditions have been improving and there has been a slight increase of wages in some sections.

Stan Morin Home From Baseball Wars; Saw Goodly Number of Big League Teams Play; Other Events

Home from the baseball wars on the eastern front, Stan Morin has many interesting anecdotes and impressions to relate to the local sporting fraternity. Always regarded as Prince Rupert's first ranking authority on matters relating to the diamond, Stan's status as a baseball sage is now stronger than ever. During the six weeks' trip, from which he returned Wednesday afternoon, Stan not only took in all the five World Series games at New York between the Yankees and the Giants, with the outcome of which he was well satisfied, but also saw thirteen other Big League games. At Chicago he saw the three games of the crucial National League series between the Giants and the Cubs. He also attended a four game American League series at Cleveland between Detroit Tigers and the Indians, a three game series at Pittsburgh between St. Louis Cardinals and the Pirates, two games between the Yankees and the Boston Red Sox at New York and a Chicago-Brooklyn game at Chicago. He saw nine of the sixteen Big League teams in action and is more firmly than ever of the conviction that the Yanks are the best outfit by a long way.

Stan also saw a couple of intercollegiate football games while away—Texas Aggies beating Manhattan University 14 to 7 at New York and Santa Clara winning over Portland University 28 to nothing in San Francisco.

Another high light of his trip was attending a great aquatic show at Cleveland which brought the Great Lakes Exposition to a close. This was, indeed, a wonderful event with a magnificent setting for all the best of the swimming and diving talent of the country—among them Johnny Weismuller and Eleanor Holm.

A rodeo in Madison Square Garden was another outstanding event which Stan was able to take in.

In Chicago Stan met and was entertained by Howard Frizzell, formerly of this city. He saw Doug Stork in New York and, while in Cleveland, ran into Dr. J. F. Maguire who was on a trip east at the time.

Hanging up in the Grotto is a miniature ball and bat which Stan obtained as a memento from the great Joe DiMaggio, one of the New York Yankees' "Murderers' Row."
