Big Store Hit

It is estimated that four hundred persons were killed and close to artillery shell that smashed into the crowded department store section of the international settlement today. Foreigners wounded included Anthony Billingham, correspondent of the New York Times, and Hallett Abend, chief of staff for the Times in China. There was little indication as to whether the missle was from a Japanese or Chinese gun.

A second shell pierced a United States navy warehouse near the Whangpoo River front but failed to explode while a third struck the Ward Road prison, throwing 6500 prisoners into renewed terror. Evacuation of the prison started yesterday but was blocked by Japanese protests that many of the convicts were going into the Chinese Army. Chinese dispute Japanese claims
