

At a conference with Laurier, Borden told him frankly his fears for the future efficiency of the Canadian corps without adequate replacements. He invited Laurier to join in a union government of equal membership with Borden as premier. Laurier insisted conscription should not be passed without a mandate from the people, preferably through a general election.

Borden next proposed to him to form the union government and pass the conscription law, making it operative only if the new government were sustained at the polls. Laurier said he could not enter a government which would enforce compulsory military service.
